Plans for League of Women Voters' discussions on state and local governmental services for children will be made at a meeting next Monday, January 14, at 9:30 a.m. in the home of Mrs. F. Hollister Mabley, chairman of children's service for the local League.

All leagues in the state are considering the situation of dependent, neglected, delinquent and afflicted children, so that they may be informed and in a position to consider supporting legislation to aid children in need of state services.

"LEGISLATION TO ESTABLISH public responsibility and provide adequate services is the point at which the League is centering its attention, states Mrs. Mabley. "We are studying the structure of existing facilities, how they function, what the appropriate needs are. When we have an adequate understanding of needs and existing public agencies and institutions we will be in a position to endorse legislation of our limited scope which will increase services to children in need."
