At Great Lakes For Navy Training

GREAT LAKES, Ill.—Two Birmingham, Mich., men, Verle V. Probst, seaman apprentice, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Russell V. Probst of Route 4, 1078 Berg, and Richard J. Granda, seaman recruit, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph J. Granda, 868 Ann, are undergoing recruit training at the world's largest Naval Training Center here.

In the course of their training, they will be taught seamanship, navy customs, terms, basic ordnance, gunnery signaling and navigation.

Upon completion of training, the recruits are assigned either to units of the fleet or to a service school for specialized training.

Commission Approves Purchase of 8,000 Gallons of Gasoline

The city will purchase 8,000 gallons of gasoline from the Socony-Vacuum Co. at a cost of \$1,025.64. Bids from two other firms were also received at Monday's city commission meeting.

In recommending the purchase be made from Socony-Vacuum, City Manager Donald C. Egbert said when bids are equal, purchases are made from the Standard Oil Co., because that firm has furnished gasoline to the city at times when other companies would not. However, in this case the Socony company's bid was lower.
