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OAKLAND COUNTY RED CROSS NEWS

Local chapters of the American Red Cross have been asked to train four times as many women in Home Care of the Sick in 1951 as were trained in 1950, according to Mrs. Edward Moseman of Farmington, chairman of nursing services. This will call for a total of 1600 trainees in Oakland County.

Mrs. Moseman reports that groups wishing to organize classes of 15 to 25 persons may contact the American Red Cross to obtain an instructor.

The twelve hour class will include such phases of simple nursing skills as how to follow the doctor's instructions, bathing a patient in bed, planning meals for the sick and taking temperatures.

Purpose of the classes requested by the Civil Defense department is to release as many doctors and trained nurses as possible to care for the critically ill and injured.

RALPH FORMAN, chairman of American Red Cross first aid in Oakland county, announces that this county chapter has been assigned the responsibility of training 2800 persons in Oakland County in First Aid. This quota for 1951 is seven times the quota assigned in 1950.

Classes are being organized all over the county. Those who prefer to organize their own classes may contact the Red Cross office to obtain an instructor.

Forman said classes are being organized in Royal Oak, Hazel Park, Pontiac, Lake Orion and Birmingham.

With the completion of blood donor clinics for December, conducted by the American Red Cross, Mrs. Sheldon E. Noble of Birmingham, chairman of blood donor service, announces that

1,127 pints of whole blood were secured in Oakland county.

Blood received from volunteers through the cooperation of the Detroit Regional Blood Center was made available to wounded soldiers in Korea within forty-eight hours after the donation.

Mrs. Noble and Mrs. J. W. Blanchard of Birmingham and Mrs. Mildred E. Bennett of Pontiac, will attend a meeting in Detroit on Tuesday, January 9, where they will be advised of the January blood quota.

PERSONS INTERESTED in becoming members of the American Red Cross Motor Service volunteers will have an opportunity to take the training course according to Mrs. George Pence of Birmingham, chairman of the Motor Service.

On Jan. 18, classes begin at the Southern Oakland Council of Social Agencies office, Sixth and Washington streets, Royal Oak. Instructor Ernest Davis, safety director of the AAA, will conduct classes from 10:00 a.m. until noon and 1:00 p.m. until 3:30 p.m. The course will include driving skills and other information useful to volunteers.

Any man or woman over 18 years of age and having a driver's license is eligible. Whenever possible, volunteers are requested to supply their own cars; however, there are two chapter cars at the disposal of the class.

Regular chapter volunteers transport supplies and equipment, American Red Cross volunteers personnel to veterans hospitals and army installations and transport patients to clinics.

In order to be an authorized motor service volunteer, members must have taken the standard first aid course and the Red Cross orientation course. For further information, those interested may contact Red Cross offices.

Mrs. Pence stresses that there is a need for motor service volunteers to give regularly scheduled time or to be on call for emergencies.

Mrs. Bradlee Pruden, chairman of volunteer services, said the American Red Cross requests all former nurses' aides and Gray Ladies who have not yet done so, to contact the chapter or call Mrs. W. C. Spruill, chairman of the Gray Ladies, or Mrs. Mark Garlick, of Hazel Park, chairman of nurses' aides.

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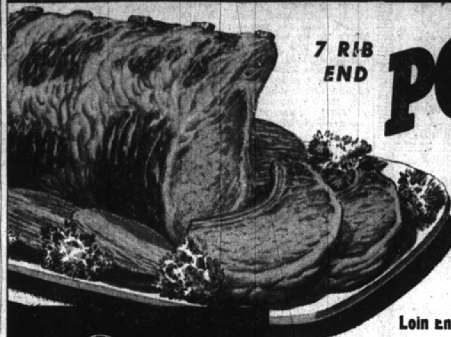
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
