## Germans Appreciate Marshall Plan Aid, Rotary Club Told

Without Marshall Plan aid Western Germany would have been in Russian hands two and a half years ago.

"That is what a Munich hotel owner told me this summer after asking me to thank my American neighbors for extending this aid to his country," W. Ralph Hildman, general secretary of the Detroit YMCA, told Birmingham Rotarians Monday noon.

Hildman this past summer took a six weeks' tour of France, Switzerland, Germany, Denmark, and England before attending the 1950 Plenary meeting of the world's committee of the YMCA at Nyborg Strand, Denmark.

"THE FRENCH are physically and spiritually tired of war and seem very reluctant to rise up again and re-arm," he explained. "The Swiss are concerned about a Russian invasion, but don't talk about it openly, he said."

## Second in January Art Exhibits Opens at Cranbrook

Second in the series of January exhibitions at the museum of the Cranbrook Academy of Art is a distinguished exhibition of prints from the Rosenwald collection of the National Gallery of Art, Washington, D. C.

The 60 prints, ranging from the 15th century to the present were selected by Miss Elizabeth Morgan, curator of prints.

Works by Durer, Mantegna, Brueghel, Rembrandt, Hogarth, Blake, Daumier, Matisse, Picasso and Hayter are included.

The exhibition is not intended to represent a cross section of the development of the graphic arts, but rather to stress intrinsic values found in prints of widely different origins and dates.

Closing date for this exhibition is Feb. 11. Museum hours are from 2 to 5 daily except Mondays.

## 1950 Activities of C Reviewed by Manager

Achievements of the Birmingham chamber of commerce in 1950 were cited in a review prepared this week by Charles Mortensen, local manager.

The report mentioned the organization's part in activities of the community council; the chamber's business committee, which worked for more uniform store hours, promotion of Friday evening shopping, off-street parking, and promoted the annual Christmas Preview, which attracted more than 6,000 persons.

Acting as a branch office of the Secretary of State as a public service, the chamber sold 14,948 license plates, processed 6,948 sales tax transactions and 2,470 title transfers.

The chamber of commerce took an active part in a "Get Out the Vote" campaign for the November election, which resulted in the largest vote in the city's history.

Mortensen is reported that the chamber is an active member of the United States Chamber of Commerce, the Michigan Retailers Association, the Michigan Commercial Secretaries Association and the community council. Mortensen is also an active member of the Birmingham civil defense committee.

## THE CHAMBER also established a national affairs committee; formed a fire prevention committee consisting of the various fire chiefs in this area; continued its representative in the mayor's traffic and safety committee; and assisted the local police department with publicity for several projects.

A committee was formed to study the proposed city budget for the year and make recommendations; the chamber continued its work on off-street parking with the view to bring this matter to a conclusion. (The board of directors has gone on record as favoring municipal off-street parking financed by revenue bonds and special assessment against the benefited business properties.)

The chamber also assisted in the annual children's Halloween party by accumulating all donations of food and transporting them to the high school. It operated an active information bureau which answered an average of 375 telephone calls and 75 letters a month asking for information of all types.

THE OFFICE ALSO furnished information to several "walk-in" inquirers and distributed 1,000 free maps of Birmingham and over 1,000 "Facts Regarding the City of Birmingham" booklets to new residents.


The organization sponsored the annual children's Christmas party at the Birmingham theater, at which about 1,000 were present.
