

Philippine Church Work Is Described By Mission Worker

Post-war conditions in the Philippines were described by Miss Bernice K. Jansen at the Jan. 9 meeting of Women's auxiliary, Christ Church Cranbrook.

Miss Jansen, an Episcopal missionary, was sent to the islands in 1946, after serving several years in Japan prior to the war. Her present duties call for classroom in St. Stephen's school for Chinese pupils in the morning. Afternoon hours are devoted to teaching Bible content at the seminary where natives are being trained for the clergy.

Miss Jansen reports that the church maintains the families of these men while they are enrolled in the seminary many come there from the husband where there is no written language.

"They come, eager to learn," she said, "and eager to take over responsibilities of the young church in the islands."

Describing conditions there, Miss Jansen said the entire country is still suffering from war damages. In many places people are still living in houses made of nothing more than corrugated boxes and wire.

"The whole area here is below sea level and without sewage. General conditions are indescribable."

Between Manila and Hong Kong, Miss Jansen went through three typhoons and was marooned by a native of Haiti, who the Igorota took her into their shack and gave her shelter for three days.

"In Tobak," she said, "they are raising money for a chapel. The women earned their first eight pesos (about \$4) by going into the woods and cutting firewood. They have organized auxiliaries and are working hard toward success."

"The work of early missionaries has made a lasting impression on these people and it is hard to believe that they are but one generation away from the headwaters."

Miss Jansen said the UTO funds were of tremendous help to missionaries in the field. The funds received go toward food and maintenance, along with the costs of teaching those in the established missions as well as those in the isolated areas of the islands.

The First Baptist church will join thousands of others in the observance of Discipleship day on Sunday, Jan. 21. The special services planned will feature three guest speakers, the Rev. Ruben Marc of Haiti; the Rev. Harold C. Schlink of New York and the Rev. Wilbur W. Bloom of Detroit.

The program will start with a buffet supper at 6 p.m., after which the pastor, the Rev. Emil Kottis, will present the guests.

Rev. Marc, pastor of the First Baptist church at Port-au-Prince, a native of Haiti, will speak of the Christian movement on the island. The son of a French Baptist missionary, he completed his theological studies in Boston, returning to his homeland as a teacher and preacher. Ten years ago, when he accepted his present pastorate, his congregation numbered 40. Today there are over 2,000 baptized members of his church.

He, with the members of his congregation, do mission extension work in 38 outstations. Rev. Schlink, representative of the American Baptist Home Mission society, will speak of the work being done by this organization throughout the United States.

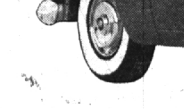

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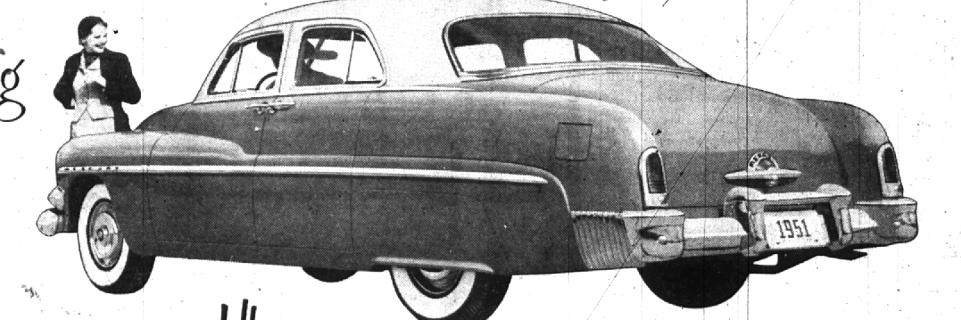
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
