1950 Fire Loss Was \$22,185, Annual Report Shows

In presenting his annual report to city officials and residents of Birmingham, Fire Chief V. W. Griffith stated that as the department was concerned, 1950 had been a good year.

"Our losses, compared with other years," he said, "were consistent. There were no lives lost and our per capita property loss was approximately \$1.23 as compared with the national average of \$4 per person."

"I am proud of all units of the department for during the year they stopped every fire at the point it had reached when they arrived on the scene."

The report shows the department answered an average of slightly more than one call a day, or 450 runs during the year. It shows 182 runs for fires and fire investigations; 149 for gas investigations; five general alarms; seven false alarms; 12 miscellaneous runs and nine for first aid administration.

ALTHOUGH THE value of property endangered by fire was \$1,129,000, damages amounted to \$22,185. This included \$13,660 on buildings and \$8,525 on contents. Insurance was received by property owners to cover \$22,110 of this amount.

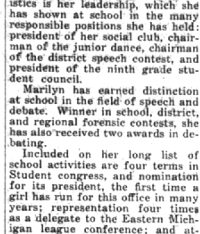

and March in the lead as danger months. Most "dangerous" hour of the day for 1950 was 3 p.m., when 24 calls were recorded.

The report of the city's water supply, also maintained by the fire department, showed a total of 609,356,000 gallons of water produced by the seven wells, an average of 104 gallons per day for each resident.

WELLS OPERATED 26,278 hours at a total cost of \$8,696.41 for electrical power. This water consumption is the second highest year for Birmingham, being exceeded in 1946 when 676,269,700 gallons were used.

INSPECTIONS made by the fire prevention bureau were 2,332, of which 191 were found to be unsatisfactory. Of these 73 were corrected.

These inspections include all public buildings in the city, cleaning establishments, stores, garages, inflammable liquids, bulk plants, apartment houses, public and parochial schools, day nurseries and churches.

DURING THE YEAR this department conducted 50 fire drills in schools and made several appearances in the efforts of educational service on fire prevention. Firemen were present at some 50 public affairs where a check on public buildings was felt to be necessary.

Chief Griffith pointed out that the current report listed one department member, Fire Marshall George Scott, who is on leave of absence while serving with the U. S. Air Force.

Hills Police Find Youths Involved in Five Burglaries

Alertness on the part of two Bloomfield Hills policemen resulted in the apprehension of two youths sought by Detroit, Saginaw and Flint police.

Last Thursday Sgt. Walter Sluiter and Patrolman Joe Pinter noticed the suspicious conduct of two youths driving a car on Woodward. When the driver, Robert G. Hardy, 18, of Detroit couldn't produce the car registration he and his 14-year-old companion were taken to the Hills police station.

Questioned at headquarters, the pair admitted stealing the car in Saginaw earlier that day. Articles found in the vehicle were later found to have been taken in burglaries in Detroit and Flint.

The youths were turned over to Detroit police, who say they had been involved in five different cases. Hardy is now awaiting sentence and the boy was turned over to juvenile authorities.

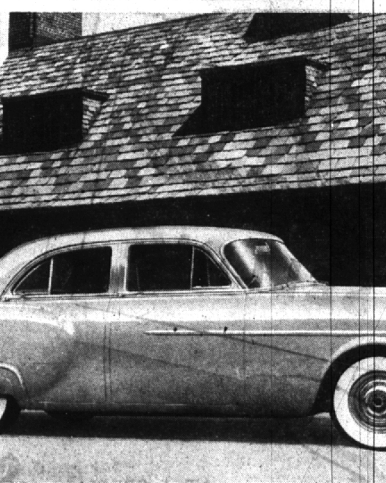
A Purdy street resident appeared at the commission meeting and complained that the buses are damaging the street.
