On January 20 and 21, Royal Oak will participate in blood collection at 213 Troy Turn Hall. Another blood bank will be set up at St. Michael Church in Southfield Township on February ninth.

The American Red Cross has been called into service to supply whole blood to save the lives of wounded soldiers in Korea. Each person who is in good health and between the ages of 18 and 69 is urged to donate a pint of his blood to bring one of our boys home alive.

Judge George B. Hartrick of Royal Oak, has been named Chairman of the 1951 American Red Cross Fund Campaign. The appointment was made by Dr. Robert W. Kelso of Pleasant Ridge. Within the next few weeks, Judge Hartrick will announce his aides.
