

### City to Pay Full Installment of Red Run Drain Assessment

In order to save \$4,231.18 in interest, the city commission Tuesday evening approved a recommendation by City Manager Donald C. Egbert that the city pay its Red Run assessment in full. Total amount of the assessment is \$16,111.77 and can be spread over 16 years. This year it will be necessary to pay one year's interest at 4% which is \$604.47. By paying the amount in full, the assessment will be \$15,716.24.

AN AMOUNT OF \$15,302.01 has been levied on the winter rolls to pay city-at-large drain assessments. This money will not all be collected before the assessment for the Red Run drain should be paid April, 1951.

The commission approved Egbert's recommendation that \$5,000 be advanced from surplus to the city-at-large drain fund to enable the assessment to be paid in full at this time. The money advanced will be repaid from future levies for city-at-large drain assessments.

The Bloomfield township board of supervisors will hold its monthly meeting Monday evening, Jan. 8, according to Supervisor David Anderson. He said routine business will be discussed.

### Maple Cage Team To Play First League Contests

Starting off the new year with the first league contest on their schedule and their first regular home game, Birmingham meets arch rival Ferndale Friday evening, Jan. 5, in a game at 8 in Baldwin gym, following a curtain raiser between the reserve squads of the schools which begins at 7.

So far this season the Maples have played three games with only one win to their credit. After losing 52-45 on Grand Rapids Union's home floor, the Maples came through with a 67-52 win at Greenville the next night.

IN THE TRADITIONAL alumni game, four virtual starters for the varsity watched from the bench, sidelined with injuries, while the alumni turned in a 50-45 win.

Ferndale has had three encounters to date, coming out on top in two of them. Ferndale's Coach Larry Burkhardt reports that he has eight letter men back this year. Possible starters for Ferndale are Birmingham, Harry Michaels and Jerry Gillikin, center Jack Hodge, and guards Don Moore and Jerry Kassar.

Because of a series of troublesome injuries, it is doubtful who will start for Birmingham. Harry Wall, leading Maple scorer with 53 points in two games, has been troubled with a bad ankle and broken wrist. Guard Don Halpin has had an infection in his elbow while Tom Tracy, guard, sprained his thumb.

NEXT TUESDAY night the Maples go to Mount Clemens for their second consecutive league game, at 8 p.m. in the Mount Clemens gym. The Bathers have played two games this season, losing 49-43 to Grosse Pointe and beating Roseville 49-45.

Coach Charles Nemeth reports that the five probable starters are center Jim Berry, forwards Mark Howard and Bonner Upshaw, and guards Gerald Frederick and Lester Kalkuk.

### Atomic Advisor C. E. Heussner Funeral Today

Carl E. Heussner, 51, of 552 Brookside, died Tuesday in Memorial hospital, Detroit.

Mr. Heussner was one of the engineers who worked in an advisory capacity on the Manhattan atom bomb project.

He was born in Marlette on Sept. 15, 1899, and attended the public schools there. He later attended Albion college and Wayne university. He received his master's degree from the University of Wisconsin and his doctor of philosophy degree from the University of Michigan.

Mr. Heussner became associated with the Chrysler corporation as a materials engineer and was credited with solving the nickel shortage during the critical stages of the making of the atomic bomb.

HE WAS a member of many technical societies including the American Electro-Platers, Electro Chemical, American Society for Testing Materials and Detroit Engineering. He was also a member of the board of directors of the Kreege-Hooker library.

On Aug. 5, 1929, he married Helen Oviatt in Detroit who survives with three brothers, Alex, George and Martin Heussner, all of Marlette.

He served with the Marine Corps during the first World War and has been associated with Chrysler for the past 25 years. A prayer service will be conducted by the Rev. Dr. W. Glen Harris, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, at the Bell funeral home at 5:15 Thursday afternoon. At 3 o'clock Dr. J. A. Vance will conduct services in the Woodlawn cemetery chapel where interment will be made.

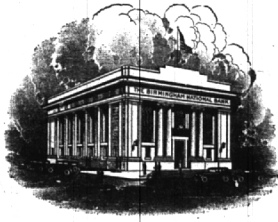
