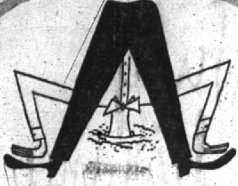


**GM Executive To Address Kiwanis Club**

**Trinity In Tears In Rehearsal At Greek Theater**

Auditions for the new drama, "Trinity in Tears", were held last week, and the casting of the show is under way, with rehearsals scheduled to begin immediately. The Greek Theater at Cranbrook has been reserved from August 22 to 25 inclusive for the first presentation of this original story by Austin Jones of Grandwood Ave.

Mr. Jones, a recent graduate of the University of Illinois, majored in creative writing, with particular stress on dramatic writing. The theme which predominated his last summer's nationally acclaimed, "Millennium Sunday". This brought to the Cranbrook outdoor stage the exciting combination of music, drama and modern dance, integrated with the setting of a revival meeting.  
Directing the dancers this year, as last, is Marion Neville Kirk. A former student of Martha Graham, Charles Weidman and Louis Horst, Miss Kirk has taught at Cornell University, and is now at the Cranbrook Summer School of the Theater.  
The unusual score for "Trinity in Tears" has been composed by Dorothy Stephenson of Minnesota. Acting as technical director is Randall Garrison, who for the past three years has taught at the Cranbrook Summer Theater.

THIS YEAR'S production will stress even more strongly the combination of dance and drama, with the orchestral accompaniment as a haunting background. The audience has a clear view of two stage levels surmounting a hillside. Viewed behind the Greek theatre are formal pools, arches, and fountains. This entire area will be used to stage the drama.

**Big Bear Drops Idea of Parking Lot on Torry**
