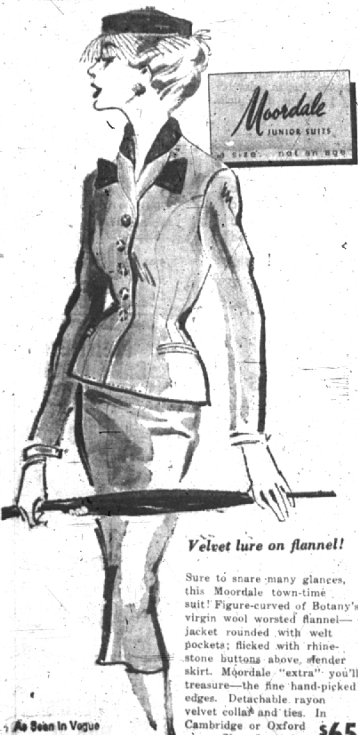

Youth Killed In 16 Mile-Crooks Crash

A 15-year-old youth, Norman M. Stovall, 303 Hickory, Troy township, was killed Tuesday evening when the motor scooter he was driving crashed into a car at Crooks and Big Beaver roads, Troy township.

Charles G. Marcus, 25495 York road, Royal Oak, driver of the car, told sheriff's officers the boy failed to step for the Crooks road intersection, and he was unable to see the scooter in time to halt. Witnesses also verified this statement.

The Stovall youth, who sustained a fractured skull, was dead upon admittance to St. Joseph Hospital.

B'field Twp. Areas Annexed to Bham. Will Bring \$1,393

With the annexation of "The Heights" and "Quarton Heath" to Birmingham from Bloomfield township, the city is entitled to a total of \$1,398.42 of the net assets of the township, according to Elmer W. Haack, Birmingham assessor.

Haack said these figures were based on assets as of the date of annexation. The Heights became a part of Birmingham in 1940. Quarton Heath in 1948. The proposed figure for Birmingham to receive is \$1,304.78 for "The Heights" and \$88.64 from the Quarton parcel.

These figures were approved by city commissioners Monday evening and will be presented to the Bloomfield township board at its Aug. 13 meeting by Supervisor Dave Anderson.

Remanded to Juvenile Court

Joseph Basalisco, 15, of Delemere road, Troy township, became a ward of the Oakland County juvenile court Tuesday after a hearing before Judge Arthur Moore. He will remain with county authorities until such time as they feel he may return to his family.

The youth was charged with the careless handling of a .22 rifle which resulted in the death of 13-year old Gordon Smith of Walnut Lake.

Basalisco, with his brother Nick, 11; Marvin Feldman, 13 and Don Harley, 10, all of route 8, were reportedly shooting at cans in an artificial pond in Troy township when they met the Smith boy and Carlos Orlando, 2488 Yorkshire, who were hunting frogs.

Orlando told police they called a warning to Basalisco, telling him to watch where he was shoot-

ing. Shortly after, the Smith lad was struck in the head as he bent over to pick up a frog.

THE BOY WAS taken to St. Joseph Mercy hospital, Pontiac, where he failed to regain consciousness even after the bullet was removed by surgery. He died there July 18, five days after the shooting.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. Reginald L. Smith, 5735 Euclid drive, Walnut Lake, Gordon was an honor student at Walnut Lake school and a member of its Boy Scout troop.

He was also a member of the school band. Surviving besides his parents are two sisters, Ruth and Karin, and a brother, David. His grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Smith, and Mr. and Mrs. John G. Findlay, all of Detroit, also survive.

Services were held from the Bell funeral chapel Saturday morning with burial in White Chapel cemetery.

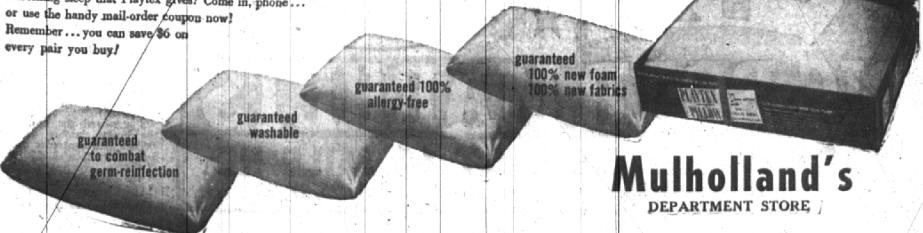

Couple Captures High Honors in Skeet Tourney

Mr. and Mrs. George W. Webster, 21711 Hampstead, Franklin, returned this week from Homestead, Hot Springs, Va., where they collected several silver trophies in the annual Clark Trophy Skeet shoot July 10-27.

Approximately 1,000 shooters from various sections of the country competed.

Mrs. Webster captured the ladies' title in the 410 gauge event and he broke 99 out of 100 birds. He placed second in the Class C-410 gauge event, and second in the 30 gauge, Class A.

He and C. J. Crites of Rosedale Park placed second in the two team event.

Crites won the runner-up trophy for the entire shoot. He engaged in a shoot-off for 12 rounds before the winner was decided. During one period, he broke 274 out of 275 birds.

Mr. and Mrs. Crites accompanied the Websters to the event. Webster is former president of the Detroit Gun club, and an ex-state champion skeet shooter.

Leaving Accident Scene In Bloomfield Hills Costs Driver \$100

Charged with leaving the scene of an accident, Edgar Richard Remeske of Royal Oak was fined \$50 and assessed \$50 costs in Bloomfield Hills Justice court this week.

Police stated he was involved in a property damage accident at Long Lake and Woodward, but proceeded on. Remeske was apprehended at Quarton and Woodward.

In other court cases in the Hills this week, Paul D. Mason of Royal Oak was fined \$40 on a reckless driving charge for cutting traffic at 86 miles an hour.

William E. Brooks of Pontiac also paid a \$40 fine for reckless driving.

Southfield Approves Bid For Halls

Another step toward Southfield township's goal for additional fire protection was taken by the township board Tuesday evening as a contract for construction of two fire halls was awarded to the Thomas Wilson Co. of Detroit for \$62,000.

The halls will be built at Nine Mile and Prosper and on 13 Mile near Southfield. Townships only fire hall is now located on 10 Mile near Northwestern.

THE BOARD originally opened bids July 13, but decided at that time that all were too high and turned them back for revisions.

Supervisor William Roeser stated that contracts have been awarded to dig wells at both sites, and the hall construction will get underway after the wells are in. In other business, all activities of the building department were again placed under the supervision of the building inspector. Last winter the board voted to separate functions of the building department and electrical inspectors. Roeser also was authorized to employ a new plumbing inspector.

A RESOLUTION from the Ferndale City commission was read, asking Southfield to join with other South Oakland county municipalities in sponsoring a drainage survey for the area.

The board supported the resolution and will adopt a similar one. Roeser pointed out that drainage is one of the township's major problems and everything possible should be done to solve it.

Paving for Streamwood Lane was approved and bids for the work will be opened at a special meeting, Thursday, Aug. 9. At the same session, the board will review the special assessment district for paving of Dorset West and hear any objections.
