

One Dead, Seven Injured in Hills Crash

One man was killed and seven injured late Sunday afternoon as the driver of a pickup truck apparently lost control of his vehicle in the heavy Woodward avenue traffic and crashed into a fence between Chesterfield and Quanton roads, Bloomfield Hills. Witnesses told police the truck driver, Wilson Williams of Detroit, and Joseph Basham of Highland Park were racing southward on Woodward and cutting in and out of traffic. However, police say it hasn't been verified that Basham cut in front of the truck at the time of the accident.

DEAD ON ARRIVAL at General Hospital was Enoch Williams, address unknown, a passenger in the truck. Those injured, all who were riding in the truck and from Detroit were Sylvester Smith, concussion and leg cut; James Hunt, fractured neck; Emuel Taylor, 12, bruises; Nole Taylor, 10, bruises; Josephine Smith, bruises; Dolores Taylor, internal injuries; and the driver, Wilson, broken ribs.

Bloomfield Hills Police Chief L. C. Banks said police haven't been able to obtain a statement from Wilson because he hasn't yet been coherent or responsive. Basham was released, pending further investigation.

The pickup truck was totally demolished. At the time of the crash, the passengers were reported hurled into the air.

Traffic was particularly heavy when the crash occurred because of the usual Sunday conditions and the fact that the Bloomfield Hills Open Hunt show was just concluding.

City Purchases \$617,600 More Fire Insurance

Following the recommendations of Harold T. Hagen, agent of record, the city commission Monday evening approved the purchase of an additional \$617,600 worth of fire insurance.

Cost of premium for five years will be \$2,164.75. The first year it will be \$3,789.88; and the second, third, fourth and fifth anniversaries the cost will amount to \$1,395.66 each. Policies will be issued as of July 1.

Commissioners also approved a \$105,000 dishonesty position bond with faithful performance of duty on the city manager, city clerk, all policemen and five treasurer's office employees. Premium will be \$1,029.12 for three years.

A \$10,000 dishonesty position bond without faithful performance of duty was approved for all other city employees. Premium is \$550.18 for three years.

The additional \$617,600 fire insurance was added to the \$476,000 contained in previous policies. Estimated value of city property is \$1,367,000 and \$1,090,800 worth of fire insurance will be taken out.

The matter was referred to the city manager to be brought out as site developments proceed.

Work on School Behind Schedule

Birmingham school board members voted to cancel their July 17 meeting because no important items are scheduled for the balance of the month.

Birmingham school board members will meet the contractor and architect of the new high school Saturday morning for a tour of the building and discussion of work progress.

Steel deliveries early in the spring were three months behind schedule, although some of this time has been made up.

Architect Robert Swanson, who designed the school, said manpower shortages are now causing some difficulty. He revealed high school classes may be delayed at least two weeks.

"We'll know more definitely after Saturday's meeting," he said.

Release Memorial

City commissioners have voted to release the Rotary club Peace Memorial in order that it might be placed at the entrance of the new high school building. The memorial was given to the city some time ago and has been awaiting the selection of an appropriate site.
