Commissioner Lance Minor said he believed the city should stay away from the state act which has previously caused controversy. Malleshoff pointed out that most items in the state act are incorporated in the new ordinance as a paraphrase rather than exact language.

Mallender also suggested that action on approving the ordinance be held over another week as commissioner Dean Beyer hadn't had an opportunity to compare it with the state act.

However, Minor moved for the passage and Frank Rising seconded it. Mallender then moved the ordinance be amended by deleting the section providing that members of the board must live in the city.

He said, "I don't believe the commission should preclude any future commission from possibly employing the source of qualified non-residents since this new ordinance makes the planning board advisory only."

Rising then said that that was his understanding because of a four to three vote taken following last week's meeting.

Commissioner Ralph Main pointed out that there are three or three as he was on the fence.
