

City to Request Domogalla to Return

Just how fast 1955 can go toward ridding Querton Lake of pesky weed growths and algae concerned city commissioners Monday evening, as considerable discussion took place regarding various possible solutions to this long-lasting problem.

It was finally decided to ask Dr. Bernard Domogalla of Butler, Wis. to come back and determine just exactly what results can be guaranteed by future work and what portions of the lake should be cleaned.

In a letter to the city last week, Domogalla stated that more money would be needed to eliminate the weed growth than the \$25,000 originally appropriated. He suggested that this sum be used to chemically spray one-third of the lake for removal of weed growth.

COMMISSIONER LANCE Minor recommended city officials contact the persons responsible for the elimination of algae and weeds from the Belle Isle lagoons. He added he wasn't in favor of spending \$5,000 or any sum until a thorough investigation is made of the situation.

Commissioner Milton Mallender pointed out that the lake was drained four years ago but still

the city has spent more money on Querton lake than the value of those jobs. You must admit that. One suggestion made was that the lake could be dredged so deep that weeds wouldn't grow, but this would mean an expense of some \$125,000, it was estimated several years ago.

Commissioner Ralph Main suggested copper sulphate as the solution to the problem. He pointed out that if it did harm the fish, the conservation department could always restock the lake.

After the commission agreed to ask Domogalla to again visit the lake, Mallender stated, "I don't think he can guarantee results any more than a doctor can guarantee results for a patient with a malignant disease."

Weekend's Traffic Problem Discussed By Commission

The city's action in prohibiting parking on sections of West Maple during parts of Friday and Saturday while the National Open golf tournament was underway at Oakland Hills was discussed at Monday evening's city commission meeting.

Some businessmen had complained that business was affected by the prohibition on parking.

CITY MANAGER Donald C. Egbert stated that maps and literature telling about the routing of traffic along West Maple already had gone out when the city heard about it.

Mayor Chad Ritchie said, "There has been enough publicity about the Open for a year. If city officials had gone to Oakland Hills eight months ago, cars could have been routed another way."

Commissioner Frank Rising pointed out that cars also proceeded along other routes. He said Lahser particularly carried an extremely large part of the traffic.

Parking was prohibited on the south side of West Maple while traffic was moving to the Open, and on the north side while coming back.

Vacation of Dixie street and a portion of Yankee street was approved by the city commission Monday evening.

Residents who favored the vacating of these streets argued that unnecessary traffic came there in order to bypass the Maple-Adams stoplight. The commission had previously approved the closing of the stub ends of Dixie and Yankee between Villa and the Porritt site.

Portions vacated were Yankee between East Maple and Dixie from East Maple to Villa. Easements will be returned the full width of the streets until such time as the utilities are relocated.

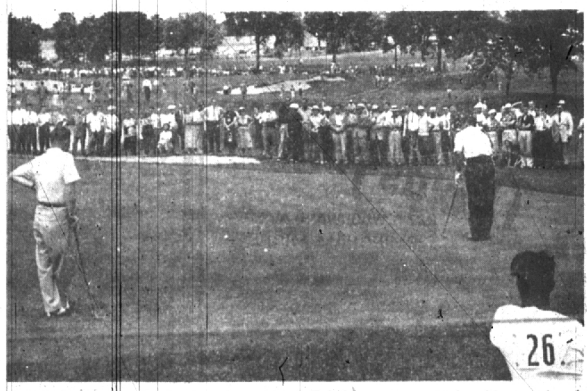
