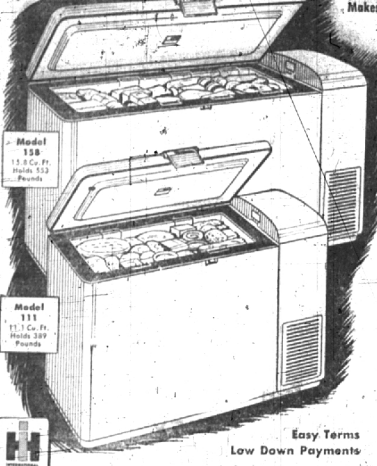


Degrees Awarded Seven Localities Attending Wayne

Dr. Ralph J. Bunche, United Nations official and winner of the 1950 Nobel Peace Prize delivered the principal address at Wayne University's commencement exercises in the State Fair Grounds Coliseum, Detroit, last Thursday evening. Dr. Bunche, who spoke at Wayne earlier this year, is director of the United Nations' Department of Trusteeship. In December of last year he received the Nobel award for his work in negotiating peace in Palestine. Dr. David D. Healy, president of the University, presented the degrees and lead the students in a declaration of civic loyalty. 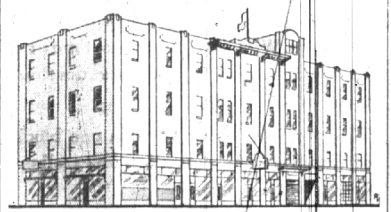
