**State Horse Show At Open Hunt Club Ends Sunday Night**

More than 100 exhibitors from 13 states will show more than 400 horses in Michigan's largest horse show since the early '30's when the Detroit Horse Show opened at Bloomfield Open Hunt club Tuesday morning at 8:30.

The only Class A show in Michigan, the 34th annual Detroit Horse Show is an official sports event for Detroit's 250,000-day Festival. A total of \$15,000 in cash prizes, plus many valuable trophies, will be awarded winners in 13 classes. Top cash prizes of \$1,000 are offered in several stake classes.

Indiana is sending 30 exhibitors with 45 horses to appear in the show, closely approaching the 36 Michigan exhibitors who will show more than 200 horses. Illinois, with 14 exhibitors, and Ohio, with 13, are other states well represented in the event.

One exhibitor is bringing a horse all the way from Florida to appear in the show, while another is coming from Kansas with an entry. An international flavor is added to the show by two entries from London, Ontario.

For the first time in several years, the Bloomfield show is showing breeds other than hunters and jumpers. Classes for 3-gaited and 5-gaited saddle horses, walking horses, polo ponies, and western-type horses have been included in the 1951 show.

Starting times for the show are 8:30 a.m. and 1:00 p.m., with each day's activities ending at 5:00 p.m. The show runs for six days through Sunday, July 1. Officials of the Detroit Horse Show are G. Fred Morris, president; Rocco DiMarco, vice-president; G. M. Pierce, vice-president; Carney D. Matheson, vice-president; Mrs. Carlton Higbie, secretary; and Graham John Graham, treasurer.

Judges are George B. Elliott, Toronto; Jack Spratt, Westbury, L. I., and Ray Kettman, Shelbyville, Ky.
