Despite its numerous contributions to the education and progress of Detroit and surrounding areas, the Art Institute is a financial orphan when compared with similar institutions of other cities, many of which are smaller than our own.

The Museum is facing a serious crisis for within the next year, unquestionably will be offered chances to add importantly to its collections. But unless funds available to purchase additions are increased greatly, it will be forced to stand idly by and watch other museums bid in the notes. As a result the museum's value to the people of Detroit and Michigan will suffer.

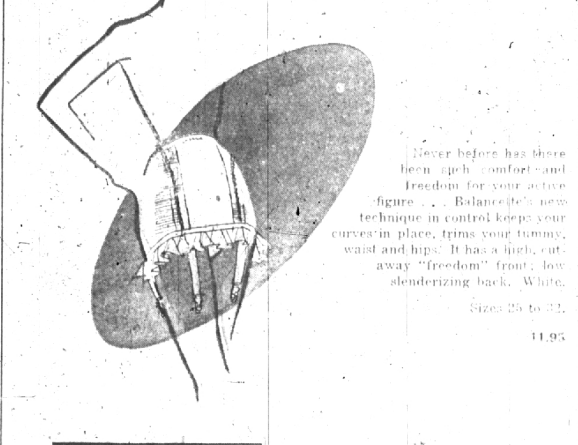
