**LEGAL NOTICES**  
**RULES AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE USE AND OCCUPANCY OF STATE LANDS**  
Pursuant to the authority vested in the Commission of Conservation by the provisions of Act No. 17, Public Acts of 1921, as amended, the following rules and regulations are hereby made and adopted concerning the use and occupancy of all state lands administered by, or under the control of, the Department of Conservation:  
1. It shall be unlawful:  
a. To enter, use or occupy state lands for any purpose when such lands are posted against such entry, use or occupancy as determined by the Department of Conservation.  
b. To camp for more than 15 days without the written permission of an authorized representative of the Department of Conservation.  
c. To anchor or leave boats unattended on any waterway, canal, dam and address, if legible letters, is affixed in plain view.  
d. To store or leave bottles, fish, cans, or other articles on state lands without the written permission of an authorized representative of the Department of Conservation.  
e. To have collected refuse and rubbish, including tin cans, bottles, and fish, on or about state lands, or to have such refuse or rubbish on or about state lands.  
f. To build a fire without proper precautions, including the use of a fire extinguisher, or to leave a fire burning without extinguishing same.  
g. To use state lands for a commercial purpose without the written permission of an authorized representative of the Department of Conservation, or of any other agency of the State.  
h. To erect a fence, barrier, the construction of which requires the use of state lands, without the written permission of an authorized representative of the Department of Conservation, or of any other agency of the State.

These rules and regulations shall be in full and effect until May 1, 1952.  
**PENALTY**  
Violation of any rule or failure to perform any act set forth in the rules is punishable by a fine of not more than \$100 and costs of prosecution, or by imprisonment in the county jail for not more than 90 days, or both fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.
