Full Baseball Program Planned This Summer

The most complete baseball program ever offered in Birmingham will be available for boys from eight to 21 this summer. First activities will get underway June 18 when four Little League Baseball teams start play at St. James and Pierce diamonds.

The city recreation board will in addition to sponsoring its regular Class A and B leagues, provide for boys eight to 12 who are not regulars in the Little League. These boys will play each afternoon at St. James park.

RECREATION DIRECTOR Frank Whitney stated that this league will be used to develop ability in boys and also supplement talent for the Little League baseball organization later in the season. These teams will be ready for membership when and in the number of Little League teams increased next year.

Whitney stated, "This league will be limited to boys eight to 12. We hope they will take advantage of the opportunity."

The Recreation board will not furnish uniforms but will make available a catching equipment, bats and mitts. The season will start at 2 p.m. June 26 and close in August.

Plans for the Birmingham recreation baseball league for boys from 12 to 18 years, age, were also announced this week by Director Hugh Loveland.

Two leagues, class A and B will play this summer. Class B is primarily for boys 12 to 15 years of age by July 1. Teams in this league will play each afternoon at Pierce field. These squads will be coached and managed by older boys from the same league.

An unusual feature of the Class B league is that if there aren't enough players, the older boys can play any position except pitcher or catcher.

CLASS A LEAGUE will play two evenings a week at Pierce field. Although this league is intended for older boys, the younger ones can play if they work in the afternoon.

Loveland stated, "Our main purpose in forming the leagues is to give money boys as possible an opportunity to play."

Umpiring for the recreation baseball league will be handled by the boys themselves. Questionnaires are now being prepared for the prospective players, manager or umpires to fill out.

Last year the league was called the Woodward League and 156 boys competed and played 50 games.

Later in the season, an all star team will be selected to play the winner of each league. In addition, at the close of the play awards for outstanding performances will be given.

These leagues will get underway June 26. Boys interested in playing contact Loveland at Hartum court. He also added that complete teams will be welcomed.

City Interested In Paing Portion Of Lincoln Avenue

City Manager Donald C. Egbert has been authorized by the city commission to negotiate with the board of education to see what can be done about constructing pavement on Lincoln, from Terry to Taunton.

The school district owns property for the entire block on the north side of Lincoln and the ownership extends through to Cole street for five lots adjacent to Terry, according to Egbert. Pavement construction would involve only the school district and the city.

New Officer Named To Police Force

A former Pontiac policeman, Charles H. Blashfield, has been accepted for the vacant position in the department, Police Chief Ralph W. Moxley said Monday.

Blashfield, a veteran of World War II, is 29 years old. He has had two years service with the Pontiac department.

Moxley said the new patrolman had studied business administration at the University of Michigan and had taken the police identification course at the Institute of Applied Science in Chicago.

Blashfield will begin his duties here about the middle of June.

City Owned Lot To Go on Sale

City Assessor Elmer Haack has been directed by the city commission to show prospective bidders at the corner of Bloomfield Court and Woodward avenue.

The city originally acquired this land for use as a well site but deferred action because of a shortage of additional funds for a test well wasn't justified in this location.

Funds received from the sale of the property will be used toward construction and improvement of city buildings.

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Elementary School Facilities Show All-Time High

Elementary schools in Birmingham will start the 1951-52 year with 103 faculty members, an increase of 40 teachers for the past five years.

A break-down by school years by Dr. Dwight B. Ireland, superintendent of schools, shows 23 elementary teachers for 1947-48; 70 for 1948-49; 76 for 1949-50; 86 for 1950-51 and 103 for 1951-52.

At the beginning of the 1949-50 school year, Ireland said, "the average class size in elementary schools was 30 pupils to a teacher. It reached 35 by the end of that year."

Named President Of Association

Howard R. Coan, teacher of French at Cranbrook school, has been elected president of the Association of Independent Schools of Metropolitan Detroit, according to an announcement by retiring President John W. Rater, Jr., headmaster of Detroit University school.

Other officers elected to official positions with the Association include Miss Helen Phillips of Kingswood school, Vice-President; and Mrs. Carolyn Levin of the City and County school, secretary.
