Driver Education Program Resumed In Local Schools

Driver education will be resumed next fall in the Birmingham school system after a lapse of two years.

Louis D. Pary, who was hired last week, will devote about half of his time to this work and the remainder to the physical education program in elementary schools.

Norman A. Wolfe, assistant superintendent, said Friday that the original driver-training program had been conducted in the junior high school.

"The program there was carried on for two years," he said, "but as the enrollment grew we could no longer work it into the schedule. With the many changes in the school program we are again able to offer the course to our students when they enter senior high school."

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Hearing to Consider Southfield Zoning Ordinance Change

A public meeting has been set for 8 p.m., Thursday, June 7, at the Southfield High School, corner of 16 Mile and Berg roads, to consider a change in the Southfield zoning ordinance.

The hearing has been called by the zoning board, and the proposed amendment would prohibit use of ready built homes or structures from being moved into the township for use as residences.

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
