Asks City About Plans for Park Street Curve

There are no plans before the city commission regarding Park street north of Hamilton, City Commissioner Milton F. Mallerder emphasized to John W. Gaffill, 201 Park.

Gaffill appeared before the commission yesterday night to learn what the city intends to do, if anything, about straightening out the Park street curve into Hamilton.

"As far as any of us know, we haven't any action before us except the extension of Park street from Hamilton to E. Maple, partial right-of-way of which the city now has," Mallerder said.

Gaffill explained that city engineers have placed stakes in his property, the plan commission and city assessor's office have lines on maps "which supposedly call for straightening of the curve at the expense of losing a corner of his home."

Barnard Outlines GOP Objectives in Troy Township

Some of the objectives of the Republican candidates for Troy township offices were outlined this week by Norman R. Barnard, present township clerk and candidate for supervisor on the GOP ticket.

He stated, "I wish to make it clear that it is our intention to present a constructive program for betterment which will best serve the people of Troy township."

HE POINTED OUT that the candidates are aware of the many improvements desirable now and others rapidly becoming urgent such as road improvements, drains, public lighting, police protection, sewers and rubbish and garbage disposal.

Barnard said, "We feel that the people know that such improvements can only be provided by tax dollars. Your township board should undertake to provide these facilities and improvements but only after approval by a majority vote of the people."

The Republican candidates are heartily in favor of industrial and commercial development for the benefits of employment, service and tax income which they bring to the township, he stated. However, he added that the proper location of these developments present a major problem.
