NINTH GRADE SOCIAL studies class of Miss Leila Hildebrand and George Miller have been divided with Miss Muriel Brusler, girl's counselor, taking the girls and Samuel Bennett, principal, and Malcolm Tindall, boys' counselor, working with the boys every other day for the last four weeks. The girls have been informally discussing a unit on the development of personality. They learned about different kinds of personalities, how they change, how to handle common feelings such as anger, nervousness, and shyness, and how to get along with all types of people. As extra credit work, many girls made notebooks. Bennett instructed the boys for the first two weeks in a course much like that of the girls. For the last two weeks, Tindall interpreted the results of the California achievement tests which the students took at the beginning of the year, why they were given and what results of their own particular tests indicate. The tests are retained as part of each student's personal record and can be consulted by teachers or interpreted to parents by arranging an appointment with the counselors. The tests, taken at regular intervals, help in the scheduling for tenth grade and are a help to the senior high counselors.

New Music Theory Course Started

The course validates all music credits which they may be used for entrance to any college or university accredited by the North Central association. Previously acceptance of music credits has been limited. Prerequisite to this course is familiarity with the piano keyboard and harmonizing of simple melodic lines. The course will cover basic fundamentals of music, which consist of terms applied to music, notes, the staff, treble and bass clef, scales, intervals and chords.

VICTOR ULRICH, instructor, says that the students will also work with the actual writing and harmonizing of simple four part melody and a great deal of work at the keyboard. Aural theory work, which is hearing a simple melody and being able to write it down will be included. Special attention will also be given to exercises in rhythm and rhythmic dictation. The pattern for the course is set by the music education national conference.

Maple Cage Team Takes 45-38 Win Over E. Detroit

In the last quarter speedy Maple guard Tom Tracy sustained a foot injury and had to be carried from the floor. It is doubtful whether he will be able to play in the state tournaments.

BARRY WALL, Birmingham center, again took scoring honors with 17 markers for the locals. This boosts his total to 289 points this season, which eclipses the all-time scoring record of 274 set in 1947 by Chuck Murray, present captain of the Michigan squad. Early last week, the Maples went on a rampage in a non-league game with Redford Union. Catch-
