Residents No Longer Register Objections To Mail Service Cut

"Now that the public is used to it, it seems to be working no hardship. We received a number of calls at first, but it has been some time since anyone expressed any objections." This is the answer Acting Postmaster Bernard Fowler gave last week when asked how the one

mail delivery per day was being accepted in Birmingham. The system was ordered last May by postal officials in an attempt to cut expenses, and went into effect here about June 1. Spot checks made throughout the city showed residents had accepted the idea and experienced little, if any, inconvenience from it. As one lady put it, "Once a day! Only get mail once a month, and that's all bills and downtown advertising!"
