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State Reconsiders, Approves New City Water Bond Issue

After reconsidering a previous decision, the Michigan Finance Commission in Lansing Tuesday afternoon approved a \$250,000 revenue bond issue to permit Birmingham to build more arterial water mains and a new 500,000-gallon storage tank on Derby road near the railroad.

At a March 6 meeting of the finance commission turned down the bond issue, pointing out that three projects included in a previous \$125,000 bond issue had not been constructed yet.

Monday night the city commission placed \$15,000 in escrow for the specific purpose of completing these three projects this year.

ARMED WITH this resolution, City Manager Donald C. Egbert went to the re-hearing Tuesday to present additional facts.

The finance commission was particularly interested to learn Birmingham's water revenue had improved more by those up-arterial mains than by those up in the original bond issue," the manager explained.

All the contracts necessary to complete this year the construction involved in the \$250,000 issue, plus that remaining under the previous \$125,000 issue, will be before the city commission Monday night for action, Egbert said.

budget. The rest of its income is \$2,500 from revenues and the board of education's recreational expenditure of \$7,500.

Expenditures are \$9,390. They are: playground leadership, \$1,400; specialists, \$4,150; supplies for craft shops and handicraft, \$410; activities (ice skating, festivals, and ice carnival), \$2,700; administration, \$100; contingency, \$600.

AFTER THE TUITION revenues of \$1,250 are deducted, the city's share is \$8,160. The \$1,300 increase would cover the following activities requested by taxpayers: leadership for summer playgrounds at Holy Name, Pembroke and Torry; instructor for tennis and badminton; and an ice carnival.

The report stated that in the past years, the board has recognized that the city was levying close to the top limit of taxes and that the board of education was faced with the necessity of constructing new buildings and increasing its teaching staff to meet the needs of the growing community.

It pointed out that in an effort to cooperate with these two groups, the recreation board has endeavored to keep down its requests in the current budget from year to year.

Annual Warning Issued Against Burning Grass

"It's time to warn householders of the danger of grass fires again," Fire Chief V. W. Griffith said Tuesday morning.

"Our trucks have already made several runs to extinguish grass fires which have endangered homes."

A great many grass fires start when ordinary rubbish fires get out of hand. Others are caused by the usual flurry of cleaning up the yard ready for summer.

"We want to remind residents that wherever the grass is extra long, additional precaution should be taken with all bonfires. It isn't exactly for the department that we ask this, but for the lives and property in the area."

"THE WINTER'S snows have melted and the strong winds of spring have gotten that grass tinder dry. Just a spark is enough to start a blaze going that may leave you without a house."

Griffith urged that where rubbish is being burned some adult should remain on duty to keep it under control. He suggested having bonfires on damp days, keeping children away, and never leaving a fire unattended.

"Don't, under any circumstances," he warned, "begin to burn off old grass when there is any breeze at all. When you do, try to have a hose handy by and remember that a wet sack, a shovel or an old, worn broom should be kept within easy reach."

"These are most effective against surface fires and will help stop one or control one with a minimum of danger to nearby buildings."

Quarant Algae Growth Treatment Approved by City

Definite steps will be taken this year to attempt to eliminate the algae growth on Quorton Lake.

This matter was assured Monday evening when the city commission appropriated \$985 to Dr. Bernard Domogalla of Butler, Wis., and contract to Birmingham to chemically treat the lake area. He'll make several sprayings this year bringing in his own special spray equipment, personnel and chemicals.

The nationally recognized expert will also study the flowing waters and attempt to work out a procedure to stop future contamination of the lake.

IN MAKING THE motion for the appropriation, Commissioner Milton Malender stated, "I move \$985 be put in the Quorton Lake algae removal fund and instruct Dr. Domogalla to start in, but the commission doesn't issue a guarantee with it."

Lawrence H. Pomeroy, 660 Lakeside, chairman of the Quorton Lake citizen's committee, appeared at the meeting and said that Domogalla's plan seemed reasonable.

He also stated, "We know it's been an eyesore and a problem and appreciate your interest and hope you will continue it."

LeRoy E. Kiefer, 1001 Willow Lane, asked the commission to do something about controlling the dumping of dirt from excavations into the lot on the west side of the lake.

City Manager Donald C. Egbert said he would contact the lot owner and see if some control can be decided upon.
