

Southfield Twp. Vote on Justice Vacancy in Doubt

Whether or not Southfield township voters will elect a new justice April 2 to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Hugh C. White is still in doubt. Two weeks ago the township board appointed James Lovano to fill the vacancy. However, Corporation Counsel Harry Merritt ruled that because the vacancy was created before the biennial election, the new appointment would only stand until April 2. In the addition the ballot was to provide for a write-in vote on both the Democrat and Republican tickets.

HOWEVER AT Tuesday evening's township board meeting, Harold F. Murphy, Democrat candidate for supervisor, appeared and said the township should consult its attorney before a definite decision was made. He said he would go along with

the decision if the township attorney also concurred. He claimed the write-in vote wasn't fair to his party because he hadn't been notified about the vacancy. Some board members felt that the wording of Merritt's ruling wasn't clear enough. With only Mrs. Fannie Adams and Miss Clara Lane dissenting, the board voted to get the opinion of Township Attorney Julius Berna on whether or not the appointment of Lovano should stand. The board also tentatively approved a new street parking ordinance for the township. Before it goes into effect, a public hearing will be called and the board will again study it. The board agreed to pay its share of the cost for send-off parties for men leaving from draft board 66. The cost will be based on population and Southfield's share will be approximately \$180.
