

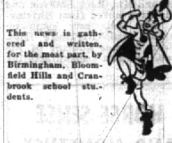
Ergasterion Group Slates Spring Play

Cranbrook Baseball Squad Starts Training Trip to North Carolina

A spring training trip to North Carolina highlights the 21-game baseball schedule released by Cranbrook school. The 11-day swing, beginning March 15, will see Cranbrook meet Henderson and Raleigh High schools and Oak Ridge junior college. Three more games are pending.

In addition, the local team will stay and practice at several Southern colleges, including Washington and Lee University, Wake Forest college, and Elon college.

The 1950-51 season, which is identical to last year's, except that Dearborn has been added, Cranbrook compiled a very creditable 14-win and 3-loss record in 1950, tying with Cleveland University school for the Inter-State Prep School League title.

SEVEN LETTERMEN return from last year's club, but the pitching staff must be completely rebuilt due to the graduation of all four hurlers. Capt. Jack Knobel will handle the catching duties, while in the infield, the junior second-base combination of John Hatch and John Edison return for their third year at short and second, and sophomore Bob Newey will again be at third base. First base will be filled by sophomore Harry Lomason.

Jack Manning, a fixture for the last two seasons, will be in centerfield, with junior Dan Newey playing his second year in left. Right field will go to Jim Pateron or Stan Hirt, both juniors from last year's squad.

Four men probably will handle the pitching for Cranbrook. This includes two seniors, Tom Connor, from the junior varsity and Al Levy, a left-hander converted from first base. The other two pitchers will be junior Dick Sargent and sophomore Bill Soter, both new to Cranbrook.

This year 20 homerooms are participating, with each playing two games. The top 10 will play in the playoffs which will be over before Easter vacation. A trophy is annually awarded the winner.



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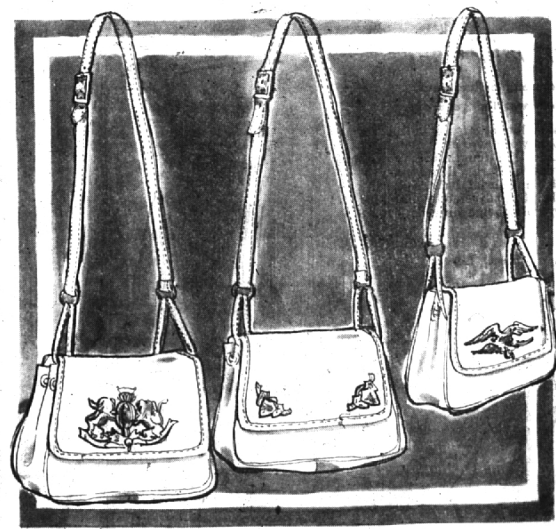
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
