

Members Appointed Senate Bill 109 Favored by City

Civil defense council members appointed this week for Bloomingfield Hills include Mrs. Lyman Craig, Mrs. I. H. McKenzie, John Bugas and Henry Woolfenden. The appointments were made by Paul Friedrich, defense director.

Senate Bill 109 has the support of the Birmingham city commission. If passed by the state legislature, it would be possible for hospital authorities to convey their assets to a non-profit hospital serving the same area.

Monday evening the city commission approved a resolution favoring the bill. Along with the resolution will go a suggestion that the word "public" in the bill be made broader.

Troy School Board Renews Superintendent's Contract

Contracts of Superintendent Stuart Baker and Assistant Superintendent William Schroeder have been renewed for another three years by the Troy township school board.

This year Baker is completing his twenty-eighth year of school work. During that time he has served as either principal or superintendent for 22 years. He was at Big Beaver for 20 years.

At last week's meeting, the board also accepted the resignation of Emery Clippert, an instructor at Log Cabin school. Clippert leaves the Troy schools to take a position at the Ford Motor Co.

Donald Hill, Wayne university graduate was appointed to fill the vacancy until the completion of the school year.

In other business, a committee consisting of Ray James and Lee McComb was named to review the coming year's budget with Baker.

THE BUDGET WILL BE APPROVED at the next meeting, April 10. Following that meeting, it will be filed with the county. Baker said that an increase in the budget will be necessary this year, because due to the hike in enrollment, five more high school teachers and one elementary instructor will be added.

The superintendent stated that work on the new high school is progressing. Plastering, painting and cabinet work is being started this week. He stated that the gymnasium is expected to be completed in time for graduation exercises this spring.

A bid to furnish shades for the new school has been awarded to the Bensinger firm of Ferndale.
