PROPOSAL NO. 1
PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION RELATIVE TO ANNUAL REGULAR SESSIONS OF THE LEGISLATURE

No. 1 A Joint Resolution of the 1951 Legislature proposing an amendment to Section 13 of Article V of the State Constitution providing for annual regular sessions of the Legislature. Shall Section 13 of Article V be amended?

PROPOSAL NO. 2
PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION BY ADDING A NEW SECTION TO ARTICLE X, AUTHORIZING THE PAYMENT OF A DEATH BENEFIT BONUS WITH RESPECT TO MILITARY SERVICE

No. 2 A Joint Resolution of the 1951 Legislature proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article XVI of the State Constitution, permitting an increase of salaries of Supreme Court Justices after election or appointment, so that all Justices serving on the date of the election shall receive the same salaries. Shall Section 5 of Article XVI be amended?

Notice Relative to Opening and Closing of the Polls

Election Law, Revision of 1943

(3093) Section 1. On the day of any election the polls shall be opened at 7 o'clock in the forenoon, and shall be continued open until 8 o'clock in the afternoon and no longer. Every qualified elector present and in line at the polls at the hour prescribed for the closing thereof shall be allowed to vote.

The Polls of said election will be open at 7 o'clock a.m. and will remain open until 8 o'clock p.m. of said day of election.
