# Bloomfield Area Red Cross Drive Now Underway

More than 50 solicitors this week are making a house to house canvass in the Bloomfield Hills-Bloomfield township area for the annual Red Cross drive, according to Max H. Fruhauf, Bloomfield division chairman.

Goal of the drive is \$7,000. The campaign started March 14, when letters were sent to area residents. Fruhauf said that to date, \$1,475 has been received in reply to the letters and as part of the United Foundation drive last fall.

**THE CHAIRMAN** stated he is very gratified with the results so far. He pointed out, "Practically all contributors have increased the size of their gifts and many have doubled."
