Annual Baldwin High School Careers Day Scheduled Thursday, April 5

The annual Careers day planned by the Baldwin high school guidance department, a student committee and the YMCA is set for Monday, April 5.

This is the day for high school students who have selected their vocations or have some idea as to what type of work they will enter and also for those senior boys who are still doubtful about the draft to be given a chance to talk with experts in all sorts of professions and vocations.

Some of the fields of interest are advertising, automotive industry, business administration, airline careers, commercial art, fashion design, engineering and interior decoration.

OTHERS ARE journalism, merchandising, modeling, nursing, occupational therapy and physical therapy, local and state police, secretarial, salesmanship, social service and teaching.

Still others are architecture, beauty shop, professional dancing, dentistry, dramatics, farming, forestry, hotel management, nursery school, ministry, home economics, draftsman, florist, insurance, laboratory technician, law and medicine.

Concluding the list are music, photography, professional sports, radio-television and speech correction.

The program begins with a homeroom period during which Principal Ross A. Wagner will address the students over the public address system explaining the purpose of careers day.

LATER STUDENTS will assemble in the auditorium where representatives of the army, navy, marines, air force and Wac will talk.

Selected to introduce speakers for the vocations or professions are student chairmen. The first part of each period will be an informal talk on fields of interest with discussion and question period.

The second period will follow the same plan with a student chairman conducting the discussion. At 11:05, students will return to homerooms to evaluate the day in its relation to the individual.

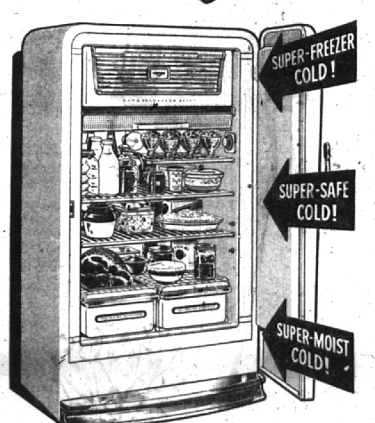

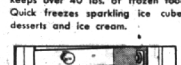
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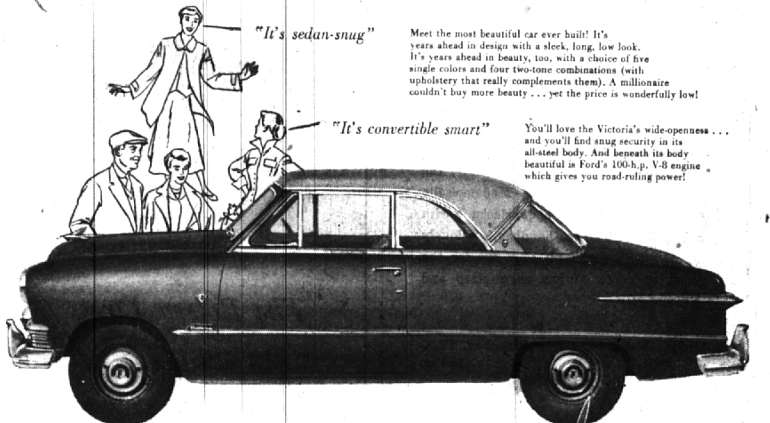
