Contests Slated for Surrounding Townships

Issues will be at stake when voters of Southfield, Troy, Bloomfield and West Bloomfield townships go to the polls April 2.

Although only one slate of candidates appears on the ballots in Bloomfield and West Bloomfield townships, each will have a local question to decide.

In Southfield and Troy townships, in addition to partisan races for all township offices, residents will vote on local questions.

PROBABLY THE closest race will take place in Troy township, when the Republican party attempts to regain control. Incumbent Democrat Charles R. Ryan is opposing the present Republican Township Clerk Norman R. Barnard for the supervisor's position.

Others trying for offices in Troy are as follows: clerk, Clifton Truesdell (R), Garland Aebel (D); treasurer, incumbent Alice E. James (D), Fred W. Hildebrandt (R); justice of the peace, (two to be elected) incumbent George W. Ford (R), J. Wesley Smith (R), Malcolm Garrock (D) and Donald J. Flynn (D).

Board of review, Elmer M. Schroeder (R), Alexander Gow (D); highway commissioner, Charles Temple (R), James E. Lane (D); constable (four to be elected) Republicans Wallace Eady, Harry Godfrey, Melvin K. Shook and David V. Sprout, and Democrats Bert S. Griffin, Clinton B. Mullins, Ray E. Face, Jr. and Thomas H. Tucker.

Proposal one on the Troy ballot will be whether or not to ban hunting in that area for the next five years.

Other township races are as follows: clerk, incumbent Fannie Adams (R), Lillian E. Waldron (D), treasurer, incumbent Clara Lane (R), Lucille M. Hunt (D); justice of the peace (two to be elected) Margaret C. Bradley Greenfield (R), Elmer Conski (D).

Because of the recent resignation of Hugh C. White from a justice position, a vacancy exists and will be filled by means of write-in votes.

THERE IS ONE local issue on the Southfield ballot in accordance with action taken and approved at the adjourned annual meeting last April. The following proposition will appear: "Shall the Southfield township board be authorized to erect a new township hall?"

In West Bloomfield township, only the Citizens Party is on the ballot and there will be no contest for local offices. However, voters will be asked to decide whether liquor shall be served by the class in the township.

The same situation exists in Bloomfield township as in Southfield township appears on the ballot. Recently a GOP state head-

ed by present Supervisor David Anderson was nominated at a township caucus.

HOWEVER, An important issue is at stake in Bloomfield township. Voters will decide whether they wish to keep the present method of nominating township candidates by means of a caucus, or go back to the more common primary election system.

The caucus was adopted there in 1932. Recently there have been complaints that the township is becoming too large to nominate candidates by the caucus system.

In Bloomfield Hills, three incumbent city commissioners are opposed for election. The candidates are Clarence Otter, Harry J. Klingler and Walter O. Briggs, Jr. Incumbent Dominick Vetrano is unsupported for constable.
