Biennial Spring and Annual City Election Notice

To the Qualified Electors of the City of Birmingham, County of Oakland, State of Michigan.
Notice is hereby given that a Biennial Spring and Annual City Election will be held in the City of Birmingham, County of Oakland, State of Michigan, on MONDAY, APRIL 2, 1951 at the places of holding the election in said city as indicated below, viz:
Precinct 1—Quarton School, Corner Chesterfield and Oak Streets
Precinct 2—Holy Name School—Main Entrance—NORTH-WEST CORNER OF BUILDING—GREENWOOD STREET
Precinct 3—Adams School, Corner Adams and Oakland Avenues

Precinct 5—Tory School, 1658 East Lincoln, Corner of Tory Precinct 6—Pierce School, 1828 Pierce Street

Special Assessments—Percentage of Costs to be Assessed
Shall the Charter of the City of Birmingham be amended by Amending Section 2 of Chapter X thereof to eliminate the requirement that the city pay a portion of the cost of every local improvement?
No. 2—A portion of the cost of the Charter of the City of Birmingham is Printed Herewith, immediately followed by the Proposed Amendment to Section 2 of Chapter X)
No. 3—No more than eighty-five per cent (85%) of the cost of any such public improvement shall be borne by special assessment, and unless there are funds on hand appropriated for such purpose no part of the cost of such public improvement in excess of twenty-five per cent (25%) of the total cost thereof, shall be paid or assumed by the city unless the same shall have been approved by a vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the electors voting upon such proposition at the election at which the same shall be submitted.
(Proposed amendment)
"A portion of the cost of any improvement may, in the discretion of the Commission, be assumed by the city at large. Provided, however, unless there are funds on hand appropriated for such purpose no part of the cost of such improvement in excess of twenty-five per cent (25%) of the total cost thereof, shall be paid or assumed by the city unless the same shall have been approved by a vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the electors voting upon such proposition at the election at which the same shall be submitted."
Proposition—Sale of City Owned Lands.
Shall the City sell land owned by it described as Lots 570 to 575 inc., 598 to 638 inc., 740 to 746 inc., 754 to 757 inc., and 863 to 964 inc., of "Sheffield Estates No. 1" and the North 1/2 of Lots 95, 96, 97, 98 and 99 of East Maple Gardens?"
Bonding Proposition
By Order of the City Commission there will be submitted to vote of the qualified electors of the City of Birmingham at the Regular Municipal Election to be held on April 2, 1951, the following proposition:
Shall the City of Birmingham, Oakland County, Michigan borrow the sum of \$39,000 in bonds therefor for the purpose of widening and improving West Maple Avenue from Chester to Linden?
Only those electors owning property in the City assessed for taxation and the husbands or wives of such electors are entitled to vote on this proposition.
On the day of the election, the polls will be open at 7 o'clock a.m. and will remain open until 8 o'clock p.m. of said day of election.

Public to Have Chance to Air Korean Doubts

Birmingham members of the Foreign Policy association, who have been questioning the actions of the United States in the Korean crisis, will have the opportunity to air their doubts Thursday March 29, in Detroit.

The occasion will be the appearance of Dean Rusk, assistant Secretary of State on Far Eastern affairs at the Rackham building on Woodward avenue at 8 p.m. Under the sponsorship of the association and Wayne university, Rusk will speak on "Objectives of American Foreign Policy."

Many of Michigan's leading groups have accepted invitations to attend the meeting which will be open for public discussion after Rusk's formal talk.

Specific objectives of the Y's Men's club in service to the Y.M.C.A. through organized boys' work, young men's activities and development of international fellowship.

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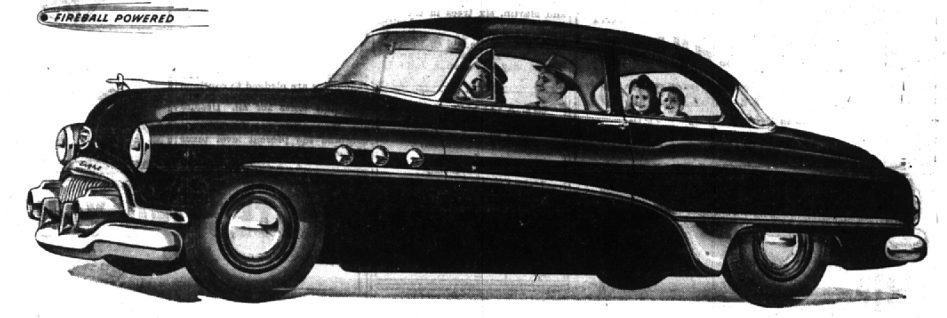
