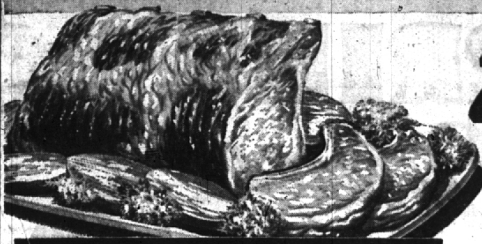

PTA Members Want To Exchange Ideas

By popular demand, parents and teachers of the Adams PTA will meet at the school March 12 at 8 p.m. to continue their mutual group discussions about the needs of children and ways to make them grow.

Subject of next Monday's meeting is "Discipline and Self-Discipline."

Declared Harry Kaecher, program chairman, "In the January discussion group, the parents came to some conclusions which have great importance in the planning of our PTA program."

"They wanted more group discussion meetings on subjects concerning their children. They liked this method of sharing ideas."

"They agreed that parents are responsible to a greater degree than the school for the way children grow up."

"THEY WANTED meetings planned around definite subjects to help them in raising their children."

He said the March 12 discussions meet the wishes of Adams school parents as expressed at the last meeting.

In commenting on the discussion subject, Richard Featherstone, principal of both Adams and Terry schools, said: "Discipline is a subject which the parents indicated was of major interest to them."

"In our orientation meeting with the entire PTA at the beginning of the evening, we plan to explain the three major ways in which people think about discipline."

"THESE ARE the Authoritarian, of Do-as-I-Say method; the Laissez Faire, or Do-as-You-Wish method; and the Democratic, or Let's-Talk-It-Over-and-Get-it-Better method."

"Education has established definite facts about methods of improving the quantity and quality of output by factory workers. We believe that similar facts can be established in helping our children to grow into happy, responsible citizens."

"Exchanging ideas in group discussions seems a useful way for parents and teachers to determine effective ways to achieve this important goal," the principal concluded.
