To Wed In Fall

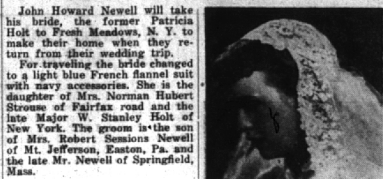
