Commission Adopts Resolution Opposing Certain Legislation

The city commission Monday evening went on record in opposing state legislation which would regulate hours of employment of any class of municipal employees. The resolution was adopted by the State House of representatives making it mandatory for each city and village over 1,000 population to place patrolmen on a 40-hour week except in an emergency. Legislation also proposed to require every city and village having a paid or partly-paid fire department to give employees an additional 24 hours of duty in every eight day period.

CITY ATTORNEY Forbes S. Haswell said that this legislation would constitute a serious impairment of home rule. "The whole issue involved in whether city home rule means anything," he stated. "Copies of the resolution will be sent to State Senator George N. Higgins and Representative Howard R. Estes."

In the resolution, the commission opposed any class legislation and any similar legislation invading the rights of Michigan cities to administer their affairs. It also revealed that it supports the right of all city employees to seek improved working conditions through their own municipal legislative bodies and without regulation by the state legislature.

Newly elected to the board of directors were Howard Grandie and Vernon Glendon. Officers on the board are Howard Jahn, Philip Allard and Arthur Greiner. Property Owners List Objections To Rezoning Plans

Objection to proposed plans to rezone property west of Pierce street and south of Merrill street was expressed in a letter read to the city commission Monday evening. Mr. and Mrs. Jay Hunt, 311 Pierce, said that if the "plan-in-commission" endorses this plan their financial security will be penalized. The Hunts said that their property is presently zoned for business, and they have frequently been asked to sell for the purpose but refused because it was their home, and an investment for future security.

ACCORDING TO the proposed plan submitted by consultant Charles W. Barr, the property would be rezoned from business to multiple dwelling classification. The letter from the Hunts was addressed and previously sent to the plan commission, but the signers wanted to have their views on the matter look it over.

Mr. and Mrs. Hunt were told by city commissioners that the letter will be filed and given consideration whenever the area comes up for rezoning. They stated that the Hunts will be given 48 hours notice before the matter is again considered.

Senate Bill 109 Still Considered By City Commission

Before the city commission supports Senate Bill 109, they will seek the opinion of Peter J. Hanahan, secretary of the Oakland hospital board. This amendment to the Michigan statute would permit a hospital authority to "convey its property or any part thereof without monetary consideration to a nonprofit corporate organization for the purpose of owning, maintaining and operating a public hospital."

THE OAKLAND HOSPITAL board has plans to construct a \$3,500,000 hospital on Adam road, south of Maple. However the South Oakland County hospital authority has more than \$700,000 in cash and pledges for erection of a hospital at 13 Mile and Coolidge.

The latter group, of which the city of Birmingham is a member will offer its site and funds to the Oakland hospital group if the hospital is erected at the 13 mile road location. But before this can be done, the senate bill must be passed. Attorney William Hudson of Royal Oak has advised City Manager Donald C. Ebert that the bill is properly worded and will accomplish the purposes desired.

Military District Chief Tells History Of Reserve Groups

Col. James R. Urquhart, commanding the Michigan military district, told Birmingham Rotarians at their Monday evening banquet that "I think it is a shame industry will not hire a member of a Army reserve unit and not hire during these critical times."

Discussing "The Army's Civilian Component," Col. Urquhart briefly outlined the history of the organized reserve, the national guard and the ROTC.

Vaughan Student Elected President Of National Group

Nan Gordon, eleven year graduate of Vaughan school, Bloomfield Hills, was elected president of the American Junior Bowls congress last week. She has been vice-president of the national group the past year. Mrs. Gordon is expected to attend the four-day conference of the Congress which starts in Chicago March 27.
