Local Swimmers Take 44-40 Win From Trenton

The Birmingham swimmers edged out Trenton 44-40 at Trenton last Tuesday in the final dual meet of the season as the Maple 200 yard free style relay team again won the meet, breaking a 36-all tie with a first place triumph.

Midway through the meet the Maples came from behind to grab the lead, retaining it until Trenton knotted the score with a victory in the 150 yard medley relay. Although Birmingham took six first places, considerable depth kept Trenton abreast with the Maroon tankmen.

TWO MAPLE SWIMMERS performed excellently in their events. Gary Osterbeck, Maple freestyler, tied the school record in the 50 yard free style, winning the event in :25.8. Maple diver Larry Coleman turned in an excellent performance on the low board, winning with 48.4 points.

This meet climaxed a successful season, the final record showing eight dual meet victories against 20 defeats along with the third straight league crown.
