Engineering Dept. Outlines Status of 41 City Projects

Status of 41 projects were outlined in the quarterly progress report of the engineering department, which was submitted to the city commission Monday evening. The quarter ended March 31.

City Manager Donald E. Egbert commented that progress during the past three months has been "very satisfactory."

BIDS HAVE BEEN received for construction for the following projects: Lincoln paving, Adams to Terry; Adams, Lincoln to Woodward paving; Colonial Court access road; North and South Bates paving; Access drive US 10, Worth to Webster, Hazel to Chestnut and Haynes to Bowers; and Chapin crossover at US 10.

Other bids received were for Fenwick road and court paving; and Sheffield Estates One paving. Construction contracts for water mains have been awarded for St. Andrews, Maple to Pembroke; Maple, Chesterfield to Lake park; Woodward to Hunter, Dixie to Park, and Bates to Lakepark; Cranbrook, Lincoln to Midvale; Chesterfield, Quanton to Maple; 14 Mile road, Bates to Pierce; and Chester from Lincoln to Martin.

Contracts have also been awarded for water mains on Adams, Knox to Wimbleson; Pierce, Lincoln to 14 Mile road and Hunter, Haynes to Maple.

PLANS ARE COMPLETE for Forest, Brownell to Hunter paving; Pierce paving, Lincoln to 14 Mile; Bird and Smith paving; Grant to Woodward; and Hazel paving.

Plans for paving Bowers are approximately 40% complete, and plans for Ebon pavement widening from Webster to 24 Mile is about 20% completed.

The report stated that field work has been done for the Maple-Chesterfield alley; and a preliminary survey is completed for the Hampton, Grant to Woodward paving and paving in Golfview Heights.

Other projects cited are establishment of grades for the DPW yard improvement; starting a water leak survey for Birmingham.

Park Allotment paving; and work under way on descriptions for the West Maple and Merrill cutoff right-of-way.

IN ADDITION, the erection of the Deer Creek lamp is under way. The department also designed and fabricated louvers to "black-out" the green light in auxiliary traffic signals at the Maple-Eton intersection.

An estimate of cost has been prepared for temporary resurfacing of Baldwin Court. During the three-month period, a total of 42 green lights in auxiliary traffic signals for overloads for the weight restriction ordinance.

The report stated that descriptions have been written for parcels required to form the right-of-way with centerline relocated adjacent to Springdale park for the 16 Mile road right-of-way.

Four Birmingham area high school students have been awarded Regents-Alumni scholarships to the University of Michigan; it was announced Wednesday by Erich A. Walter, dean of students and chairman of the committee on university scholarships.

The local winners are Ann Marie Morrow, 439 Merrill and Lawrence Day Peck, 1449 Birmingham boulevard, Birmingham high school; and Troy high school students Leonard Rothard Gardner, 1066 Urbancrest, route Four, Birmingham, and Leland Ernest Lambert Jr., 66 Council avenue, Clawson.

For three additional years if the student's performance warrants a continuation of the privilege. The 497 scholarship winners were selected from 590 applicants representing 115 high schools.

Eligibility for the award is based upon the high school record of the individual, information provided by citizens of the community, principals' and teachers' recommendations, financial need and results of the special aptitude test taken by the candidate.

This year marks the first time that Troy High school students have received this University of Michigan scholarship.
