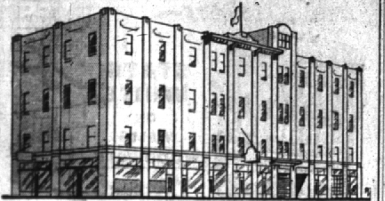
**Increases Foreseen
As School Census
Takers Plan Work**

Eleven local women will start a house-to-house canvass May 10 to obtain the census for the Birmingham school district.

Mrs. Irene Stevens, who is directing the enumeration, said that increases during the school year would indicate a much larger enrollment than last year.

Final figures last June showed 2,349 children of pre-school age and 5,002 between the ages of 5 and 19 years. Pre-school registration had increased 385, while the school-age total was up 439.

"It would seem," Mrs. Stevens said, "that the census this year would be even higher. At the opening of school last fall our second grade was the peak group and has continued to grow all year as new families moved into Birmingham."

"THE NEWCOMERS to our school district are going to make a big difference in our enrollment next September. Many new homes are being built in the city and families with school-age children take the majority of them."

Mrs. Stevens said the enrollment now is 4,142, compared with 3,842 at the end of the second week of school. Her estimate of the expected enrollment for next September is over 5,000 children.
