messages, meet friends and stop for a brief chat about world and community topics. It enjoys the same reputation today.

IN ADDITION, everyone knew, doctors and laymen alike, that no matter what the hour if "Charlie" Shain was called he would go to the store and fill a prescription. On April 4, 1934 the store was gutted by fire and while some of the old atmosphere was missing, the principles of the newly decorated store which opened May 20 were the same.

The community boasted one of the finest and best equipped drug stores in the area. This was coupled with all the old time friendliness which had developed through the years.

It was in 1912 that Mr. Shain took Miss Ethel Bassett into the firm, the first and at that time, the only registered woman pharmacist in Oakland county.

MR. SHAIN entered into community activities shortly after his purchase of the store and served continuously ever after he became ill in 1949.

In 1916 he was elected to the old Village Charter commission. He was a member of the plan commission for 15 years, beginning in 1933, and in 1933-34 was supervisor for Birmingham.

His term of office on the zoning board of appeals was from 1937 to 1949. Mr. Shain also served on the Birmingham board of education.

In 1924-25 he was president of the village. Always maintaining a keen interest in his community he served Birmingham in many other capacities through the years.

In 1927 he was elected president of the Birmingham Rotary club and was its official delegate at the international convention in Omsk, Belgium.

A few years later, in 1931, he served as chairman for the newly formed Village Players board of trustees. He also helped organize the Property Owners division of the Birmingham Real Estate board, and served as its first chairman.

The third honor which came to Mr. Shain that year was when he was elected president of the Birmingham Savings bank after serving as vice-president for some time.

HE HAD BEEN active in the affairs of the Community House since its founding and in 1939 became president of the association.

A year later he was named to head the Birmingham Retail Merchants association and has remained one of its most ardent supporters since that time. Through the organization he has constantly sought to promote better business for Birmingham and better service to its residents.

Probably the one thing to be most widely recalled in the work of Mr. Shain did in helping to organize and maintain the community Halloween celebration. In commenting on this community event, which has meant so much

to Birmingham, Mr. Shain said:

"WHEN HALLOWEEN comes along, kids are bound to raise the diabolism. It's tradition. You can't expect them to stay out of mischief but you can guide them into a non-destructive kind."

"A group of local men and women knew this, and began the community-wide celebration for all the kids, young and old, in town. Since then there has been little vandalism in Birmingham and it is my opinion that as long as we back this affair this condition will remain."

It's grown pretty big now, but the more kids there are the more parents there are to work on the parents. Frankly, I think it's worth 10 times the effort and expense and I honestly think the grownups enjoy it as much as the kids!"

IN 1946 CITY officials and fellow businessmen honored Mr. Shain at a testimonial dinner as he celebrated his 40th year in business here. Special tribute was paid him by Clarence Vliet and W. R. P. Johnson before a gathering of more than a hundred residents.

He was a member of the Rotary Club, the Chamber of Commerce, the Elks lodge, F. A. M. Knights Templar, Pontiac, and had been active in the YMCA for many years.

He is survived by his widow, the former Ruth Edgar, and several sons.

City to Purchase Rubbish Containers For Business Area

As the start of a program to keep Birmingham clean, city five rubbish containers will be distributed in the business district, according to City Manager Donald C. Egbert.

Each container, which costs \$12.65 will have stenciled on it, "Keep Your City Clean." The Chamber of Commerce also intends to contribute two or three more containers.

Commissioner Frank Rising stated at Monday's meeting, "The Chamber of Commerce is to be congratulated. I hope all other groups will take a similar interest."

Commissioner Richard Patterson also said, "I think maybe other service groups could donate two or three containers."

Southfield School Board Authorizes Dental Treatment

Provision for fluorine dental treatment for 300 school children up to the age of 14 was authorized by the Southfield Township school board Monday evening.

Treatment will be given during the 12-week summer vacation period and the dental assistant's salary and room space will be provided by the school board. Balance of the expense and work will be provided by the Children's fund of Michigan.

B'ham To Pay 6.07 Per Cent of County's Costs

Birmingham taxpayers will pay 6.07 of the county's 1951-52 budget, the county board of supervisors decided last week in apportioning the costs over municipal units in the county.

This is a 39 per cent rise over last year's proportion.

Supervisors approved the tax equalization committee's figure of \$48,091,581 for Birmingham property values. City Assessor Elmer Haack has placed the assessed value at \$35,503,350.

Under the state tax commissioner's figures, arrived at after a three-year study, Birmingham would probably have paid nearer 5.835 per cent of the county's costs.

Valuation Figures Increased for Nearby Townships

Valuations both assessed and equalized for 1951 have increased from last year in Bloomfield, West Bloomfield, Troy and Southfield townships according to figures released by the Oakland County board of supervisors.

Valuation are Southfield, assessed, \$31,299,595, equalized, \$46,424,788; Troy, assessed, \$7,892,575, equalized, \$13,010,304; Bloomfield, assessed, \$13,172,875, equalized, \$17,525,685; West Bloomfield, assessed, \$11,555,970,

equalized, \$16,876,342. The 1950 totals were as follows: Southfield, assessed, \$25,999,125, equalized, \$32,997,830; Troy, assessed, \$5,315,500, equalized, \$7,978,309; Bloomfield, assessed, \$11,595,065, equalized, \$14,451,225; West Bloomfield, assessed, \$11,223,855, equalized, \$16,162,269.

TROY TOWNSHIP Supervisor Norman K. Barnard, at the county board of supervisors meeting May 9, voted against approving the equalization committee's report.

Township officials visited the state tax commission offices in Lansing Friday to discuss the reason for the 7 1/2 hike in equalized valuation. However, Barnard stated that the township will not appeal the increase as he was told an appeal might mean an even higher valuation.

Hills' Valuation

Equalized valuation for Bloomfield Hills for 1951 was set at \$8,962,950 by the equalization committee of the county board of supervisors last week. Assessed valuation for the Hills is \$4,962,950.

DPW Garage Plans Ready by May 19

All plans and details for the construction of the new DPW garage will be given to the city commission by May 19, according to Commissioner Lance Minor. He stated that because of the current limitation on steel, wood trusses will be used in the construction. Minor added that this use will save a lot of money and avoid the waiting for shipments of steel.
