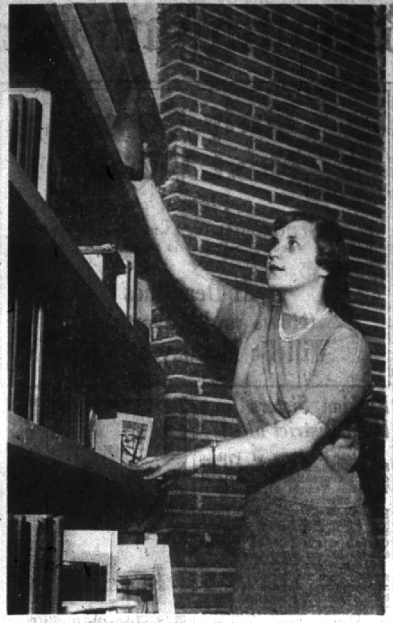

"What Reconstruction Work Could Do for Japan" will be discussed by Dr. Koyomi Koizumi of Tokyo, when the Michigan branch of the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom holds its annual meeting Saturday, May 26 at Ann Arbor. Headquarters for the session will be the International Student Center, 603 E. Madison.

The day's program includes election of state officers and business meeting from 10 a. m. to noon, followed by luncheon at the Michigan Union.

Dr. Koizumi will share honors as afternoon speaker with Elsie Picon, National President of the Women's International League, who will address the audience on "World Disarmament and World Reconstruction." At 3:30 the Ann Arbor Branch will be hostess at tea.

This international peace organization founded by Jane Addams in 1917 is open for membership to men and women interested in constructive and non-violent means for preserving international peace, and anyone interested is invited to attend this annual meeting.
