

### Dr. Samuel Dana Of U. of Michigan Speaks to League

"We must have wisely framed legislation enacted to conserve our natural resources, if we are to retain anything like our present standard of living," declared Dr. Samuel T. Dana, dean of the school of natural resources, University of Michigan, speaking to the league of Women Voters at the Community House on Monday. Recommendations of the Hoover Commission on the conservation of natural resources were the subject discussed by Dr. Dana, who served on the advisory committee of the commission.

Among other things, the Hoover Commission recommends organizational and administrative adjustments in the Department of Interior and Agriculture. They suggest that there should be a consolidation of the Bureau of Reclamation, the Dept. of the Interior and the work done by the Army Corps of Engineers.

The commission also recommends that an impartial board of review of five experts be established to study thoroughly all proposed water use projects before they are presented to Congress.

DR. DANA approves, generally, the Hoover Commission recommendations.

"Our whole economy rests on Nature and the natural resources of the U.S. are deteriorating with alarming rapidity," he said. "We eventually may reach a limit at which it will be impossible for the earth's production to keep up with its population."

He expressed the opinion that since the Federal Government owns only 7% of U. S. land resources, it cannot control conservation except through wise administration and legislation. At the present time, he said, less than 10 percent of the national budget is being spent on all natural resource activity.

The League of Women Voters will study conservation on the national level when it resumes meetings in the fall. Questioned as to what specific action the League could take to further conservation, Dr. Dana suggested that in their study, they decide which of the Hoover Commission's recommendations they approve, then actively support those recommendations by informing Congress and the President of their stand.

"Two courses are open," he said. "The President can use reorganization plans or Congress can enact legislation."

Mrs. John S. Lambie, conservation chairman of the Birmingham League, presented the speaker in cooperation with Mrs. W. W. Williams, international affairs chairman and Mrs. Covert Robertson, economics chairman.

This was the final meeting of the LWV until September.

Liberty Temple exemplified the ballot drill, Mrs. Ray Porter represented the Temple as a delegate. She was appointed a member of the resolution committee.

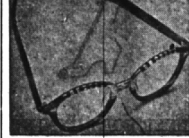
The next Temple meeting will be Thursday, May 24 at which time Mrs. Porter will give a report of the proceedings at the convention.
