

Crane Tennis Team Has Six Wins, Two Defeats

With a record of six wins and only two lost, the Cranbrook tennis squad faced Birmingham high school for the second time this season May 15, and won 4-1 on the home courts.

Two days later, Cranbrook added another victory to its record by defeating Flint Technical high school by a shutout score of 7-0 with the losers not gaining a set.

IN THE INTER-STATE league competition, the Cranes lost their third league match to Nichols school of Buffalo, N. Y., 3-2. This put Cranbrook tied for second in league standings to date.

Friday, Cranbrook entered the Michigan State Class B Regional tournament held at the Fordson School in Dearborn and finished in second place behind Birmingham high school.

Cranbrook has only three scheduled meets left this season. Two of these are scheduled against Hamtramck and the third meet is with Shadyside of Pittsburgh.

The Birmingham tennis team won its third consecutive regional class B title at Dearborn-Fordson Friday and Saturday.

Woody Dares came from behind in the crucial third set to take the singles finals from Ken Wilson of Cranbrook 6-4, 3-6, 6-6. Dares had previously beaten Lanier's G. Ferguson 6-1, 6-1, and Cranbrook's Tom Plum 6-4, 6-8, 6.

The doubles finals was an all-Birmingham event with Roger Beebe and George Bosworth dropping Bob Appleford and Peter Trees 6-4, 6-1. This is the second straight year Beebe and Bosworth have gained regional doubles laurels. Before the finals, they defeated Rochester's Seiffert and Blidoux 6-2, 7-5, and Cranbrook's Stables and Parker 2-6, 6-3, 6-4.

Appleford and Trees picked up valuable points by downing Cranbrook's Colwell and Kaplan in the semifinals 5-7, 6-3, 6-2. Lee Bertling lost in the quarterfinals as did the Maple doubles pair of Jack Maddox and Rich Spademan. Dick Emery won in quarterfinals.

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Complete scoring was Birmingham 14-5, Cranbrook 10, Rochester 5, Lapeer 3, Port Huron St. Stephens 1-5, Flint Tech 0, Plymouth 0.

By going to the regionals finals, Beebe, Bosworth, Dares, Appleford and Trees will compete in the state meet at Kalamazoo June 1, where Birmingham took fourth place last year.

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
