audit committee of the United
States Savings and Loan League.

the savings association business.
The committee on Supervision
examination and audit deals with
one of the fundamental interests
of the savings association. All the
associations operate under public
supervision by state or federal
authorities and the improvement
of the process of supervision, both
from the standpoint of cost to the
institution and of adequate knowl-
edge of the facts which are im-
portant for a public supervisory
body to know are the objectives
of the committee's year-to-year
studies.

**Elbert S. Burns,
Detroit Banker,
Buried Wednesday**
Elbert S. Burns, 61, 1802 Pil-
grim, vice-president of the Nation-
al Bank of Detroit, died in Jen-
nings Memorial hospital Sunday
morning. He had been a patient
there since a heart attack on Fri-
day.
Mr. Burns was born in Spring-
field, Ohio, on Oct. 29, 1889 and
on June 17, 1915, married Ellen
M. McBride. The family moved
here 10 years ago.
He entered the banking field in
1924 after several years with
aeronautical and automotive fields
and became associated with the
old Detroit bank. After a series
of mergers he became cashier of
the Guardian National Bank of
Commerce.
