Ruth Shain Class Marks 31st Reunion, Friday, May 11

The Ruth Shain International Affairs Class, (as far as is known the oldest of its kind in continuous session under the National A.U.W.) will conclude 31 consecutive years with the annual breakfast on Friday, May 11, at 9:30. The class, sponsored by the Birmingham University Women and Birmingham Women's Club are fortunate to have as their guest and speaker, Dr. Hans Simons, whose topic will be "Outlook for Western Europe."

Dr. Simons, President, New School for Social Research, New York City, has lectured throughout the United States and Canada; in England, France, Switzerland, under the auspices of the Foreign Policy Association, the Canadian Institute of Foreign Affairs, Y.W. Friends Service Committee and other groups in several hundred universities and colleges.

Born in Velbert, Germany, July 1893, educated at the Universities of Berlin, Munich, Bonn, Tübingen and Koenigsberg. He served in the German army, 1st World War; he was promoted and decorated for bravery after being wounded in 1917.

He acted on the staff of the German delegation to Versailles in 1919 and was co-founder of the German Association for the League of Nations, and its director, 1919-22. He was Director, Institute of Political Science, Berlin, 1924-30 (adult education school in the social sciences).

He served in the Reich Ministry of the Interior, 1934-36. Dr. Simons witnessed the downfall of the German Empire and under the Weimar Republic worked for a democratic Germany and a better international order. He became so well known as a "Fighting Democrat" he was forced to flee. He eventually reached the United States and became a citizen in 1940.

During the war, 1943-44, he was consultant to the Office of Strategic Services. In 1947-49 he was on leave as Chief of the Governmental Structures Branch, Office of Military Government, American Zone.


