CHURCH served his brother as

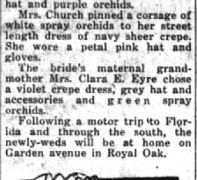
best man and another brother Leo

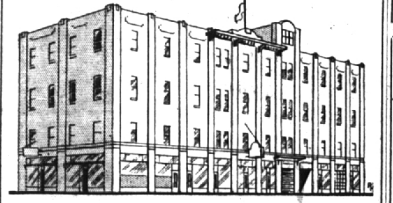
