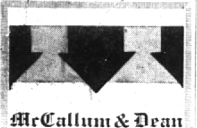

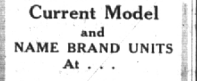

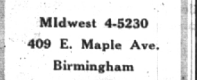

Crane Baseball Team Wins First League Game

Sophomore sensation Bill Soter pitched the Cranbrook school baseball team to an 8-2 rout over University School of Cleveland, Ohio in the Interstate League opener at Cranbrook Saturday afternoon.

He posted his fourth victory of the spring season against no defeats as he struck out 11 and walked only one. Both runs scored by the visitors were unearned.

The Ohioans were co-headers with Cranbrook of last year's Interstate League baseball title. Sharing the spotlight with Soter was John Edison, who, aside from collecting two long doubles, came up with the game's finest fielding play in the third inning when he scooped a hot liner off the bat of Rank Pildner out of the dirt and threw him out with ease.

Cranbrook, who has now won six and lost one, will travel to Mason, Ohio, to play Western Reserve Academy in another league contest Saturday, May 5.

THE CRANBROOK squad took its third straight game and fifth in six starts last Wednesday by defeating Berkley high school 9-5 in seven innings.

Dan Newey and Bill Soter each collected two of the nine Cranbrook hits.

Last Tuesday the Cranes trounced Birmingham 7-1 behind the right-handed hurling of Soter who struck out seven and issued one free pass.

John Hatch and Soter led the Blue and Gray with two hits apiece. O'Connor, Tracy and Wood each collected two of the eight Maple bingles.
