They are likely to be stationed on this desert for the next few years, for they are operating a training base. Here jet fliers come for their final training, for the final polish before they meet the enemy. It's not only hot on the desert, but it's a bit lonesome.

These men and officers have nothing to read except the few magazines which filter in. They have a movie theater on the base, but you don't feel like going to a movie every night. They need books and games. They have a fine room ready for a reading and game room, but they have only the furniture and the walls.
