After the close of the European War, she attended classes at the Sorbonne in Paris. She returned to the United States and studied at University of Columbia where she received a master's arts de-

gree and a doctor of philosophy degree. The new Dean brought out several problems of young Americans in college today. In spite of the severe strain of waiting and indecision, brought on by the war, the women students are coming into their own by seeking and obtaining executive positions. Never in the history of the University have so many women done such outstanding work.
