Curriculum problems were discussed at last week's Bloomfield Hills board of education meeting, according to Superintendent John Jacobs.

Drivers' training classes will be continued and new courses will include junior business training and physics each year. Formerly physics was taught alternating years, but it now will be offered yearly.

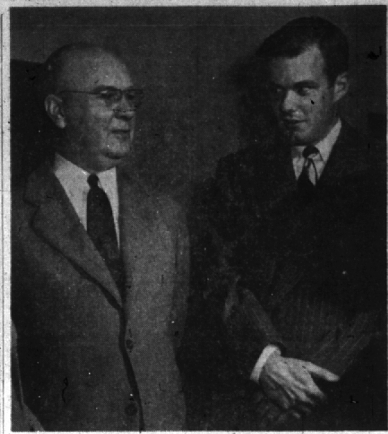
In addition, three teachers were engaged for the next school year.

They are Katherine Kemp of Bloomfield Village who will teach elementary music; Mary Barrett of Detroit, art; and Arthur Dickerson, fifth and sixth grades at Wing Lake school.

Two vacancies remain to be filled for high school music and high school English.

Jacobs stated that the board decided to dispose of the abandoned Casarsa Square Lake road. This two-room school house was used by the Bloomfield Hills district until a year ago.

Hearing June 18 On Street Closing

Dixie is a two-block street running south from East Maple, one block east of Adams. Yankee, running in the same direction, is one block east of Dixie.

The closing of Dixie came before the commission about five years ago and was discarded after several residents voiced objections.

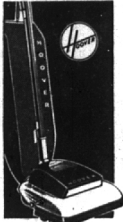
The court-in charge of Police Lt. Henry Thibault will be held each week, with sessions at the city hall following the close of the school year.
