Gothic Influence On Churches To Be Discussed

Dr. Ernest Scheyer will speak at an illustrated lecture at the Community House, Nov. 13 on "The Origin and Development of Gothic Church Architecture." The lecture, scheduled for 8 p.m., is being sponsored by the Unitarian Fellowship.

He will be presented to this audience by Merrill O. Bates of Bloomfield Hills, president of the Birmingham Fellowship. The lecture is open to the public.

Dr. Scheyer, a native of Meslau, Germany, studied at the universities of Meslau, Freiburg, Heidelberg and Cologne. He holds a doctor of philosophy degree and has also received his doctorate in political economics.

BEFORE COMING TO THE UNITED STATES he served as curator at the municipal museums of Cologne and Meslau and was instructor in the New School of Arts in Amsterdam.

He has been an honorary research fellow for the Detroit Institute of Arts and has been a lecturer of art history at Cranbrook.

Since 1937 he has been associate professor of art and humanities at Wayne university. Dr. Scheyer also has published several books on medieval and modern European art.

Port Huron outgained Birmingham 205 to 140 yards and had a 12 to 5 edge in first downs.

Coach Vincent Scouting said of the Birmingham team, "None of our boys should feel ashamed of this performance. We, as the coaching staff, realize the pressure they were under and are proud of the way they played."

The Birmingham football team travels to Waterford Friday afternoon to try to bounce back from the 13-0 loss to Port Huron last week. The team is expected to be in the lineup from the unbeatn ranks. Kickoff time will be 3 p.m. for the Maples; only one game other than the Thanksgiving day tilt with Royal Oak.

This will be the first time that the Maples have played at the new field in Waterford. Although the Waterford boys are large, the team has experienced a poor season. Its basic offensive system is the same as Birmingham's.

Birmingham has clinched at least a second place finish in the Eastern Michigan League. Only chance to gain a tie for the championship would be for Hazel Park to beat Port Huron, an extremely unlikely possibility.

Nov. 17 Final Day For Registration For Special Election

Final day for registering for the special Dec. 17 election on the proposed incorporation of Southfield Park will be Saturday, Nov. 17.

The township hall will be open for registration Monday through Friday until the deadline from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.; Saturdays from 8 a.m. to 12 noon; and Saturday, Nov. 17 from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Township Clerk Mrs. Pannie Adams will register voters in the Bruce school on Monday, Nov. 5 and 12 from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m.

Only persons living in the proposed Southfield Park area will be eligible to vote.

The proposed city includes the area bounded by Eight Mile on the south; Nine and one-half on the road on the north; Greenfield on the east; and Plum Hollow golf club on the west, with the exception of Magnolia and West-hampton subdivisions.

Three-Way Discussion Of Hamilton Scheduled
