

## Nazarene Services to Be Held in LaBelle Studio

## Recreation Discussed At Community Council

Harold Gasser, chairman of the Birmingham recreation board, Mrs. Phyllis Jackson and Frank Whitney, board members, spoke at the Thursday meeting of the Birmingham Community Council.

The trio outlined the history of the recreation board, its past accomplishments and future plans. They told of how the board is selected and how it operates, stressing the financial resources by which it is supported.

Their appearance was the first step in the Council's 1954-55 plans to determine what recreational resources the city has and what can be done about developing more services.

Mrs. Jackson briefly sketched the history of the recreation board, stating the present program has grown from basic plans formed by the Community Council in 1934.

In 1934 a committee was appointed to supervise recreational activities here through the entire year. Its membership was drawn from the various organizations, the Community House, board of education, city commission and PTA groups.

The CURRENT board is selected by the major and represented the city commission for its approval.

## Cranbrook School in 25th Year

Silver Anniversary year of Cranbrook school is under way. Doors of the Bloomfield Hills school first opened for students on Sept. 19, 1927, and the institution is in its twenty-fifth year.

A gift of Mr. and Mrs. George G. Booth, the school represented an original endowment in excess of \$1,250,000.

The first school year, as 60 boys were enrolled, registration was limited to students in grades seven through nine. Initial headmaster was Dr. William O. Stevens.

PLANS for the school group represented the first major architectural achievement in this country of Riedel Saarinen. In addition, Geza Maroti of Budapest designed most of the architectural ornaments.

At the formal opening in October that year, Dr. Clarence Cook Middle, then president of the University of Michigan spoke.

The plant in 1927 consisted of a main school unit, dormitory, gymnasium, infirmary, faculty residence and service buildings. The astronomical observatory was completely equipped and mounted.

### Library Offers New Film Service

A new service is being offered users of the Baldwin public library through its contract with the audio-visual department of the Detroit Library.

Miss Jeanne Lloyd, Baldwin librarian, said films would be available to Birmingham clubs at no cost. Subjects literally range from A to Z, covering a wide assortment of fields and professions.

BECAUSE of the huge demand for films, we are able to supply them only to local clubs," Miss Lloyd said. "We have complete lists of all films available, and invite program chairman to examine them at the library."

The films are consigned to the Baldwin library which makes all arrangements for them. Clubs using the service are expected to call for the films in Detroit and return them after use. Each group must provide its own projector and operator.

### Property Owner 'Swaps' Right-of-Way with City For Construction of Walk

Mr. and Mrs. William S. Spiegel, Donald, Chestnut street property owners, have agreed to swap seven foot right-of-way to the city in exchange for the construction of a sidewalk in front of their property immediately south of Quanton school.

## Deer Hunters May Register For Messages

As in past years the Michigan State Police and the State Department of Conservation will cooperate during the 1951 deer hunting season in making a free registration service available to hunters who desire to be reached in camp. If an emergency occurs at home, under the plan, a hunter registers at the State Police post or Conservation headquarters nearest his camp. Before leaving home he should inform his family or office of the station at which he is registering.

In the event of an emergency, those at home need only notify their nearest State Police post or Conservation headquarters and the message will be radioed to the specified registration station. Either a State Police or Conservation officer will then deliver the message to the hunter.

THE PLAN ALSO facilitates transmitting messages home if hunters are involved in accidents or reported to hospital. Only messages of an emergency nature will be handled. The service is not offered where regular communications facilities are available and can be used without delay.

All State Police posts and Conservation headquarters have supplies of registration cards. The cards will be available at State Police offices and can be handed to State Police officers stationed at the posts.

In filling out the cards hunters are urged to make sure they give accurate locations of their hunting camps and if necessary diagrams should be drawn. Each member of a hunting party should register.

College records of Birmingham high school alumni attending Cornell University during the 1908-51 school year were recently received by Principal Ross A. Wagoner.  
Enrolled at Cornell are eight Birmingham alumni and all but one have a scholastic rating above the Cornell average of 75%. The one is exactly average.  
Ward Abbott was named on the dean's list for the college degree of engineering. Students on this list must have an average of 85% or better, establishing Abbott in the top 10% of all Cornell students.

OTHER BIRMINGHAM students ranking average above are Mac Booth, George Catlin, Clifford Dunn, Delbert Keener, William Robertson and Helen Woolson.  
William C. Devin, dean of Yale, announced last week that Fred Mallender, Yale senior, was elected to Phi Beta Kappa, national scholastic honor society. He is also a member of the Yale political union, an undergraduate forum on national and world affairs.
